CENSUS ENUMERATOR HERE Increase Already Noted, Tho the Count Is Not Complete.


A gratifying increase has already been noticed by the census enumerators who have been working on the East Side, tho the complete count has not been taken.


STUDENTS HONOR TEACHER Arthur Murfin Receives a Handsome Pair of Binoculars.
