**LAKE MINNETONKA**

Minnetonka Beach is destined to be a place of beauty and the efforts of the officers of the village council are devoted to improving the pretty point wherever it is possible. The street has been broadened considerably from the Eliel cottage down to the Pineo place, the thoroughfare being too narrow for the safety and comfort of drivers. In addition to this all the streets of the village are kept in splendid condition, the grass and trees are kept trimmed, and the lavish use of the sprinkling carts keep the dust laid to rest.

At the other end of the beach the Crystal Bay Improvement association is doing its share, and to this body of residents falls the credit of carrying up the best and most attractive avenue around the lake. A man is continually employed by the association to cut the lawns and trim the shrubs, and when dry and drain when flooded. All of this is done at a small expense for the cottagers, each paying a small tax.

The garden is attractive and the pond winding its way under a small rustic bridge and among dainty paths is outlined with quaint plants and trees and huge contrast effectively with the branches of northern oak and pine.

Flower gardens around the beach can be found in an abundance and there is hardly a flower one used to see in the old-fashioned gardens that has not found a place somewhere or other at the beach. At the Will Egan place a low wall of boulders is being built to make a setting for the many beautiful blossoms of early summer and fall. The Vanderweys, who bought the old Fuller place, are also laying out a handsome garden.

The first service of the two months—July and August—will be in Camp Memorial chapel Sunday, July 1.

**RAILROADS**

**RATE CUTTING IS SEVERE**

The Soo Makes One Fare for Round-Trip East—Others May Follow.

The Soo has made a rate from Minneapolis to Montreal and other eastern points of one fare for the round trip. With the Canadian Pacific it has resolved to get a great deal of the teachers' and tourists' travel. A deep cut was necessary to offset the advantages offered for travel thru Chicago by the Western Passenger association lines.

Tickets were put on sale by the latter lines yesterday at one fare and one-third. The sale will continue until June 15, with return limit to Sept. 30.

It was said after the Soo announcement was made last night that the Chicago lines would have to meet the cut to get the business. F. M. Ruggs, northwestern passenger agent of the Burlington, thought that his road would have to meet the rate if the Soo persisted.

The rate situation has been stable for several years and the Soo's announcement has stirred matters up generally.

**GIVING TRAINS A "TRY OUT"**

The "Pennsy" Is Experimenting With Speed in the East.

Two more speed trains with the weight of the new special, which will start service tomorrow, were run yesterday by the Pennsylvania road, east of Pittsburg. One made the run of 132 miles from Altoon to Harrisburg in 128 minutes. The other made the run from Philadelphia to Harrisburg, 100.7 miles in 109 minutes.

It has been announced that the eighteen hour train would be used for the improvement of mail service between New York and Chicago. On June 18, the eighteen-hour trains on the New York Central will be employed for better mail service between the two cities.
