

The World's Markets, Traders All Waiting for Government Report

The Wheat Market Very Quiet, With Price Changes Unimportant.

Snow Issues a Rather Bearish Report Covering the Winter Wheat Crop.

But John Inglis Sends Reports from Ohio of Contrary Tenor.

Minneapolis Chamber of Commerce, June 10.—With a government report to come out this afternoon traders in wheat were not disposed to do much, and the market was quiet from start to finish.

The Commercial West says: "The trade is looking forward to the next crop of wheat with more than usual interest, because of the belief that it is anticipated will follow to the millers a more favorable condition than the crop of 1904."

From Richmond, Ind., to Springfield, Ohio, 77 miles, wheat is generally good, and the wheat on corn land is springing, so this section would make good average, as considerable wheat is being raised in the spring wheat section.

CHICAGO GRAIN BULLISH SENTIMENT IN WHEAT PIT ON KANSAS CROP REPORT.




EQUITABLE PEACE HELP TO STOCKS

New York, June 10.—The Equitable Life settlement stimulated the stock market and the large buying orders were distributed throughout the market.

Profit taking sales made their customary slight inroads on prices, but after the market had demonstrated its good absorptive power prices rose substantially above the opening level.

On heavy selling by a prominent trader the market eased off, July declining to 3 1/2c. The market, however, was only temporarily depressed and a good general demand soon resulted in recovery of practically all the losses.
