Accidental Deaths in Wisconsin, Minnesota and Iowa.

Weyauwega, Wis., June 12.—William Kleinmuth, aged 20, of Milwaukee, and Walter Middleton, aged 15, of Weyauwega, were drowned three miles from here in Wolf river.

## BIGELOW BEGINS HIS PRISON LIFE

### Son and Brother Accompany Milwaukee Defaulter to Federal Penitentiary.

New York Sun Special Service. Leavenworth, Kan., June 12.—Frank G. Bigelow, the Milwaukee banker, was brought to the United States penitentiary at Fort Leavenworth last night. John Speciale, a counterfeiter, under a five-year sentence, was brought along as a fellow-prisoner with Bigelow and they were in the charge of Andrew Johnson and Charles Kelley, deputy marshals. It is said that Marshal Reid of Milwaukee did not bring Bigelow in because he was sure a warm friend that he did not want to do so. Gordon Bigelow, a son, and Dr. Bigelow, a brother, living in Chicago, accompanied Bigelow.

Bigelow bore up fairly well during the trip except at Moline, Ill., where the deputy marshals say he broke down and wept. At another point the son broke down and the marshal informed him he was having a bad effect on his father. Bigelow seemed anxious to avoid the gaze of curious people and reporters. He wore an old slouch hat and was not nearly as neatly dressed as the counterfeiter who was brought with him. In a rooming house on railroad roads union stations were avoided.

Felon Cheered by Bigelow. On making the turn in the walk on the riverbank drive at Fort Leavenworth, when the penitentiary loomed up in front of the party, the counterfeiter showed a disposition to weaken. With a tremble the marshal spoke words of encouragement to him. Deputy Warden Lemon was at the second or inner gate, and both prisoners were ready to step into the deputy's office. Bigelow gave his name as Frank G. Bigelow, aged 58. He was searched and some plain jewelry and a small sum of money taken from him. He was asked questions and was assigned to a regular isolated cell with Speciale to spend the night. The brother and son of Bigelow remained down stairs and watched thru the grating until they saw him escorted into a cellhouse and disappear. They then sought an interview with Warden Lemon, but he is said they requested that Bigelow be assigned to light work.

Five Bankers in Prison. There are five national bank prisoners in the penitentiary. Four of these are clerks and one answers the telephone in the chief clerk's office. These bankers manifested considerable interest in Bigelow. One of them, Broderick, from Elkhardt, Ind., was a member of the National Bankers' association while Bigelow was president. Bigelow's prison number is 4717. In only a few instances have there been older prisoners brought here. If his health is not good, he may, after a few weeks, be assigned to Captain Carter's old position of prison hospital clerk. With allowances for good time he will be released from the pen in six years and four months.

Bigelow began serving his sentence in earnest today. After a fairly good rest he ate sparingly of the meagre breakfast furnished all prisoners. Later his hair was cut and a prison suit given him. He was photographed, measured by the Bertillon system and then examined by the physician. He submitted without a murmur to all that was required of him.

### Goll Says "Not Guilty."

Milwaukee, Wis., June 12.—Henry G. Goll, former assistant cashier of the First National bank today pleaded not guilty to an indictment containing thirteen counts. United States District Judge Quarles fixed bail at \$20,000. Goll will be in the custody of the United States marshal until bail is furnished. The indictment charged Goll with personally misapplying funds of the First National bank on three different occasions, the amounts in each instance being \$100,000. From the three counts charging Goll with personally using funds of the bank, ten counts charge him with making false entries in aiding and abetting G. G. Bigelow in his defalcation. The counts contained in the Bigelow indictment are practically repeated in Goll's case, except that Goll in each instance is accused with aiding and abetting the former bank president by making false entries.

Bigelow pleaded guilty to the ten counts in the indictment against him and was sentenced to ten years in prison.

### DEAN CURRIER HONORED

Seniors Present His Portrait in Oil to Iowa University.

Special to The Journal. Iowa City, Iowa, June 12.—Dean Amos N. Currier of the College of Liberal Arts, state university of Iowa, was honored today by the graduating class in the class exercises in the university campus. An oil portrait of the venerable dean, done by Professor Felix Schurig of Vienna (now in Iowa City) was presented to the university by the class. It will hang in the hall of liberal arts. The presentation speech was made by F. E. Sneider of Cherokee, Iowa, and was responded to by Dr. George E. MacLean, rector and member of the executive committee of the university. Dean Currier has been connected with the university nearly a half century. Other members on the program were as follows: President, by the class president, J. E. Goodwin, Burt; class history, Arthur C. Gordon, Iowa City; class poem, Ella Waterbury, Iowa City; class prophecy, Bertha Sumner, Iowa City; farewell exercises, H. E. Boies, Missouri Valley; and response to farewell address, Dr. T. H. Macbride of the university faculty. The committee members reviewed the career of the dean this afternoon and the seniors will give their class play, "A Russian Honey-moon," this evening.

### MICHIGAN'S OLDEST MAN

Death at Marquette of John Orushia, Aged 126.

Special to The Journal. Marquette, Mich., June 11.—John Orushia, aged 126, died unexpectedly last night after scarcely a day's illness in his native life. He was born in Ottawa in 1779 and had lived here since 1823. He is believed to have been the oldest man in Michigan.

Mrs. Olive Harlow, aged 82, is dead. She was one of the oldest pioneers of the upper peninsula, having come here in 1848 with her husband, Amos Harlow, founder of the city of Marquette.

### FIBER MILL BURNS

Loss on Building and Plant at Ashland Is \$50,000.

Ashland, Wis., June 12.—The plant of the Ashland Sulphite Fibre company was destroyed by fire at noon yesterday. Loss, \$50,000; insured for \$20,000. The mill was owned by Thomas Berdson of Ashland, but was being run under a lease by the Menasha Paper company. It will likely be rebuilt.

LA CROSSE, WIS.—The sixth annual meeting of the Letter Carriers' association of Wisconsin was held in this city tomorrow. Rev. C. H. Peterson, pastor of St. Paul's Lutheran church, has received a call from the Lutheran Business Institute and Hospital at Rochester, N. Y.
