CITY NEWS

THREE ARE DEAD THRU ACCIDENTS

THREE OTHERS HAVE EXCEEDED INGLY CLOSE CALLS.

William J. Milliken Killed by Street Cars. J. H. Warmesley - Fatally Injured in Flour Mills, and Charles Malchow Falls to Death from a Ladder—Police Frustrate an Attempt at Suicide.

Three violent deaths and several serious accidents kept the police ambulances on the go yesterday afternoon and all records for casualties were broken.

The first victim was William J. Milliken, 1601 Lyndale avenue N, who was run down by an interurban car at University and Prior avenues. St. Paul Cars were approaching him from opposite directions and thinking he could cross in front of the eastbound car in time to hail the other, he darted across. The fender of the eastbound car struck him, throwing him to the ground. He was taken to Cobb hospital, where he died two hours later. Mr. Milliken was senior partner of the firm of Milliken & McGuire, lumber dealers at 332 Boston block.

J. H. Warmesley, 2537 Bloomington avenue, was killed at the Consolidated A mill yesterday afternoon while adjusting a belt with a long pole. The pole was caught in the wheel and hurled against Warmesley's side. He died at St. Barnabas hospital in the evening. He was 35 years old and unmarried.

While the South Side wagon attended to this case, the Central wagon was called to Eleventh avenue S and Third street, where Charles Malchow, a carpenter, had fallen from a ladder while putting on widowscreens. His skull was fractured. He was taken to the city hospital and died there this forenoon. The remains were taken to the family residence, 1836 Marshall street NE.

In attempting to rescue Anna Nelson, 17, who was trying to cut the arteries of her wrist, the police officers accompanied the patrol wagon to 1700 E Lake street came near being injured. The girl, who is employed there as a domestic by Mrs. E. E. Ehle, tried to cut her wrists with a knife. When the police came she fought them off desperately but was overpowered and taken to the county jail to await a hearing in the probate court. She has been demoted for some time.

Arthur Gould, a house mover, was injured while moving a house on Sixth avenue N yesterday. The cable broke and a lever struck him in the neck, rendering him unconscious. He was taken to a physician's office by friends and the Central wagon was called to his home, 3200 Forty-third avenue S.

M. Swanson, a gasfitter, was overcome with gas while making a connection with the main at Ninth avenue S and Sixth street. He was taken to St. Barnabas hospital and later to his home, 924 Twenty-third avenue S.

NAT'L BOARD APPROVES FLOUR MILL BOYCOTT

A. E. Kellington, secretary-treasurer of the International Union of Flour and Cereal Mill Employees, has received no approval by the executive board of the American Federation of Labor of the report of President Gompers on the recent Minneapolis mill boycott investigation. Mr. Gompers reported that the boycott was justified, "both from the evidence adduced before me, as well as the unwillingness of the company to come to a better understanding with the International Union of Flour and Cereal Mill Employees." The report recommends that the boycott be continued until such times as the company may be disposed to arrive at a better understanding with the unions of its employees.

The officials of the union now look for a more general support by labor organizations. Taken in connection with the action of the State Federation of Labor in indorsing the position of the union in regard to the company, both prospects with renewed vigor, and that union labor will, from this time forward, present a united front. Labor papers, which have been lukewarm in support of the boycott, are seen to be pledged to the support of the decision. This also is the case with individuals who opposed the action of the union.

The report cites almost everything done by Mr. Gompers in connection with the case. In that portion devoted to his interview with the milling company's representative, questions and answers are repeated to show the nature of the receipt accorded. The position taken by the latter was that the strike and boycott had long ago been over.

IN HANDS OF SAINTS

Freight Agents Entertained in the Suburb Today.

Five hundred and twenty-three members of the American Association of Local Freight Agents associations made a brief visit to Lake Minnetonka last night after the disposal of all business in the city. The Great Northern had furnished its service and from Wayzata the steamer Excelsior took the party to Hotel Tonka Bay, where a splendid banquet was served.

There were several short after dinner talks. W. S. Marx of Minneapolis, proposed a motion to admit Winnipeg into the association and his motion was unanimously adopted.

This morning about 400 delegates and the ladies boarded a special Milwaukee train and were taken to St. Paul. The party stopped at Minneapolis and at Fort Snelling, arriving in St. Paul about noon. The St. Paul association has planned to show them a good time.

VETERAN DROPS DEAD

Lieutenant Thomas Mogan Quickly Summoned at Soldiers' Home.

Lieutenant Thomas Mogan, Co. K., Fifth Minnesota Infantry, dropped dead in his room at the Soldiers' Home Wednesday evening. The cause of death was heart trouble and there was no warning of the coming of the end. Lieutenant Mogan was 68 years old. He had been in the home for more than ten years. His home formerly was in Stillwater, from where he joined the army. He has a sister, Mrs. Lynn, living in that city. A daughter, who lives in Montana, has been summoned. She is expected to arrive in Minneapolis tomorrow and if she does the funeral services will be held at 10 a.m. at the home.

STATE CAPITOL STRONG SHOWING OF STATE BANKS

RESOURCES GROW RAPIDLY IN SEVEN MONTHS.

Nearly Three and a Half Million Gain in Loans and Discounts, and Deposits Grow Two Million, Time Certificates Showing Still Larger Gain—Number Increased by 37.

The resources of state banks in Minnesota increased \$4,518,174.52 between Nov. 10, 1904, and May 28, when the last call for a statement was dated. The returns from this call have exceeded the expectations of Public Examiner Kerst. The increase is due partly to the greater number of banks, increasing from 348 last November, to 385 on May 29.

SUCCEEDS HAZZARD

Robert Grieg of Pine City Is Named Park Commissioner.

Robert Grieg of Pine City was appointed by Governor Johnson today to be commissioner of the Interstate park at the Dalles of the St. Croix. He succeeds George H. Hazzard of St. Paul, who has had charge of the park for several years. The commissioner receives \$300 a year and the use of a lodge in the park.

New Incorporations.
The Goodridge-Call Lumber company of Minneapolis, a new retail "line yard" lumber concern, filed articles of incorporation today with the secretary of state. The capital stock is \$300,000. Eugene J. Carpenter is president, Fred H. Carpenter, vice president; Henry L. Call, secretary, and Irving R. Goodridge, treasurer.

The Sharrod Shoe corporation of St. Paul filed articles, with capital stock fixed at \$750,000, of which \$500,000 is preferred. In the company are C. K. Sharrod, Freeman P. Strong, William H. Elsinger, Frank C. Bostwick and Haydn S. Cole.

The State Bank of Mayer, Carver county, was today authorized to commence business on a capital stock of \$10,000. George E. Hanson is president and W. H. Shrader, cashier.
