MINNESOTA RANGE HONORS FOR COMPANY B

CHAMPIONSHIP BANNER GIVEN MINNEAPOLIS MEN TODAY.

First Breaks Camp and Sets Out for Home Trips—Records of the Men on the Different Ranges—Falk Chosen President of the Philippine Association.

Special to The Journal. Camp Lakeview, Lake City, Minn., June 19.—The men of the first regiment broke camp this afternoon and will reach their homes early in the evening.

The regiment was drawn up today without arms to witness the presentation of the championship banner to Company B. The names of the men qualifying as marksmen, of whom there are about ninety, and those who qualified as sharpshooters, about forty in number, were read.

Company B. E. D. Luce captain, holds the shooting trophy for the fifth successive year. The team started out weak on the short ranges but ended strong and took the banner on the 600-yard shoot. F. company finished a good second and led the bunch until the last shoot, when some bad scores were made.

Company B also stands first in number of sharpshooters qualifying, with eleven men, and the field staff and band with ten.

The prospects for those qualifying for "expert marksmen" on the 800 and 900-yard ranges were very poor, as there was heavy wind and the air was dense. Private St. Amant of Company B and H. F. Bradbury of Company I were the only ones to make 40 or over on the 800-yard range. The former had 44 and the latter 40.

MINNESOTA PUBLIC BUSINESS AT A STANDSTILL

FIGHT OF FACTIONS FOR POLITICAL CONTROL IN BELTRAMI. Excitement Over the Election of a Successor to County Attorney Loud Grows Daily—No Business Is Transacted—Factions Propose to Fight the Whole Matter Thru the Supreme Court.

Special to The Journal. Excitement over the election of a successor to County Attorney Loud, resigned, grows daily. The election of county commissioners to succeed Sibley and Wright, removed by Governor Johnson, resulted in the selection of I. H. Olson of Bemidji and Charles E. Saxrud of the town of Maple Ridge.

A meeting of the board of county commissioners was immediately called to elect a county attorney when it was discovered that Wesley Wright, removed by Governor Johnson, claimed that he was still a commissioner entitled to participate in the proceedings of the board, and a restraining order issued by Judge Spooner was served upon the newly elected commissioner, Axel Olson.

Arguments upon this order were heard before Judge McClellan this afternoon. The case was argued by Wesley Wright and Henry Funkley for I. H. Olson. The prolonged fight for the political control of Beltrami county has held all public business at a standstill since February last.

County Attorney Johnson refused to allow the commissioners to take part in the election of a successor to Loud, so that the election of a successor to Loud has been for months practically without a prosecuting officer, and there now appears to be no immediate prospect of a successor.

NORTHWESTERN ZOOLOGICAL Death of Judge Brookings, Prominent in Dakota Pioneer Days. YANKTON, S. D.—Word has been received of the death of Judge W. W. Brookings, one of the foremost men in the pioneer days of the state.

His first work in the state which was to make him famous was in the year 1857, when he entered Bowdoin college and was graduated in 1860. He read law and in 1867 was admitted to the bar in Brookings.

As a member of the first senate legislature, he was selected president of the body and later was provisional governor of the territory. He was a member of the senate of the state of South Dakota, being the northwest quarter of section 16, township 101, range 49. This land is the present site of the Queen Bee mill at Sioux Falls and Brookings.

He was elected twice to the territorial legislature from Yankton and served several times continuously in some branch of the public service. He was a member of the state senate of Dakota territory. He was president of the Dakota Southern railroad, the first of its kind in the territory.
