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CITY NEWS TO PRESERVE THE NORSE LANGUAGE

STIRRING PLEA MADE BY A WISCONSIN MINISTER.

Rev. O. L. Kirkeberg Wants Is Reinstated as a Compulsory Study at St. Olaf College—This May Be Done—Lutherans Adjourn to Visit Historic Muskego Church.

Whether or not Norwegian shall be a compulsory study at St. Olaf college, Northfield, is one of the live questions before the United Norwegian Lutheran church convention in session at the Augustana church, Norwegian, therefore a compulsory study, was last year made elective and if the same is restored to its former prestige it will be due to the efforts of the Rev. O. L. Kirkeberg, Tall, Wis., who yesterday brought in a minority report favoring this step.

A St. Olaf, Greek, Latin, English and German are compulsory, but the Norwegian tongue, to which is due the very existence of the school, is ignored to that extent. Mr. Kirkeberg, who is a typical viking in appearance, intensely devoted to the Norwegian tongue and the possessor of a powerful voice and a fine command of language made a stirring talk. The result was that the opponents of Norwegian asked that the minority report be sent back to the committee on schools of which Mr. Kirkeberg is a member.

A vote of thanks was ordered sent to William Jennings Bryan for the unsolicited gift of \$500 from the Bennett fund to St. Olaf college.

Last evening the Rev. N. J. Ellestad, vice president of the church, preached the pastoral sermon, which was an eloquent, inspiring address particularly directed to clergymen.

The convocation recessed this afternoon so that the delegates and visitors might visit the old Muskego church, the earliest Norwegian Lutheran church in America. While of particular interest to the children of the old church of primitive backwoods architecture will doubtless attract general attention as it becomes more known. It is located on the grounds of the United Church seminary at St. Anthony park where it will be used as a chapel.

The old church had long since been abandoned and was rapidly falling into decay when rescued for future generations by President Hoyme and the Rev. Gerhard G. Rasamussen.
