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ST. OLAF STUDENTS TO STUDY NORSK

UNITED CHURCH MAKES LANGUAGE SEMICOMPULSORY.


Waldorf College at Forest City, Iowa, is taken under the protection of the Church Despite Opposition Based Upon Territorial Grounds—Delegates Visit the Old Muskego Church.

Norwegian will be a semicompulsory study at St. Olaf college. By a compromise motion offered by President Kildahl of St. Olaf, the United Norwegian Lutheran church yesterday decided that Norwegian should be compulsory in the preparatory and college departments, but authority was given the faculty to make exceptions whenever it was justified.

Professor P. M. Glasoe was elected vice president of St. Olaf college and B. J. Borlaugh of Kenyon was elected a member of the board of trustees. Waldorf college, Forest City, Iowa, was taken under the protection of the United church, although there was much opposition because it was located in the same circuit as St. Ansgar seminary, and the church could not support two institutions founded from the same territory. President Lars Boe and Rev. Messrs. N. E. Boe and N. C. Brun argued in favor of the recognition of Waldorf college. It had been founded by clergymen and other members of the United church. The school had an enrollment of 200 students last year, and is believed to have excellent prospects.

The afternoon was spent in visiting the old Muskego church, the pioneer Norwegian Lutheran church in America, which has recently been removed to the grounds of the United church seminary at St. Anthony Park. About two thousand persons were present. Among them were Gjermond Kaasen, who had been a member of the first confirmation class in the old church. The exercises at the old church were opened with prayer by Rev. H. C. Holm. It was followed by Luther's hymn, by the alumni pocket union. Addresses were made by Rev. L. M. Bjorn of Zum-

brota and President M. O. Bockman of the seminary. All the visitors were requested to contribute toward the expense of purchasing, moving and re-erecting the church, which has cost about \$2,000.

BUMPER WHEAT CROP IN THE OHIO VALLEY

The wheat crop of the Ohio valley is going to turn out in a manner that will astonish the trade, if good weather holds for a short time, and yields may run up away beyond expectation. Advises show that the wheat is heavy and far advanced and will be coming upon the market at a date earlier than last year. None of this wheat will come to Minneapolis, but it will go into central and east central winter-wheat markets and flour-milling cities, and the general effect upon wheat prices may be in some degree depressing if the crop moves as early and as heavily as now indicated.
