



SMITH-BAKER WINS VERDICT IN KITTSOON COUNTY CASE.

Commission Company of Duluth Found to Have Ignored Plain Provisions of Law Requiring Daily Reports—Borlan of Hallock, a Track Buyer, Cleared of Fraud.

Crookston, Minn., June 21.—The Grindelblad law, passed several years ago, requiring all commission merchants handling and selling grain for individuals to make daily reports as to sales, names of purchaser and amounts received, has been upheld in an important decision of a Kittson county jury in the case of the Smith Baker Commission company of Duluth against H. B. Borlan of Hallock, a track buyer, who, the commission firm claimed, had overdrawn his account with it and refused to settle according to the figures upon the firm's books.

Congressman Stennesson, who represented the defense, made the trial one of the most brilliant seen in Kittson county for several years, and the outcome, a complete victory for the track buyer and loss for the commission company, may be held to the hope of the grain and commission law.

The Smith-Baker company alleged that Borlan overdraw his account some \$1,124 for wheat shipped the company in 1904. Borlan, in his answer, alleged that he had not been credited upon the firm's books with the proper amount. The commission firm, on the other hand, contended that Borlan's weights as given in his bills of lading were padded. On the trial it came out that the commission company had not complied with the provisions of the Grindelblad law in regard to daily reports of sales, but contended that Borlan was the firm's agent rather than the firm Borlan's. This contention, however, was not upheld by the jury, who found that the latter was an independent purchaser.

Borlan presented a counter charge of \$1,700 for an order which he held against the commission company in the settlement of the 1903 business, and the jury in awarding a verdict found for the defendant and against the plaintiff.

The provisions of the Grindelblad law read that every commission merchant doing business in Kittson county shall, at the time of each sale, make a report to every customer of such sale, and such report shall be made within four hours after the consummation of the sale, and must specify the name of purchaser and amount received. This case is the first on record in northern Minnesota in which the law has been brought out prominently in a civil action.

Mrs. Gus Schuneman, wife of Gus Schuneman, a Crookston traveling man, has begun suit for divorce and papers in the case were served here today. Mrs. Schuneman a little over a year ago went west, supposedly to visit friends upon the coast. About the time of her departure a well-known man of the town disappeared and was found to be short in his accounts. Warrants were issued for his arrest, but also Pinkerton men were detailed on the case no trace of him could be found. Later on it was learned that Mrs. Schuneman had departed with the young man and that her wardrobe provided a disguise for the fleeing fugitive.

The fact that the divorce case is based upon alleged non-support and cruelty is a surprise, as in all of Mr. Schuneman's career in this city he has been known to do a dishonorable act and his friends will not believe that his wife was driven from her home by harsh measures.

Addresses of welcome will be made by the local representatives of the participating churches, Congregational and Baptist, and be responded to by Miss Alice Beck, Miss Mary, "Prayer Meetings," Miss Florence Foss, Misses, "In Church Services," Henry Bailey, Monday evening, "Graves will have an address on "Christian Endeavor and Evangelism," on Saturday morning. The program for the day will be "The Christian Endeavor," by J. W. Ford, treasurer of the Christian Endeavor, will convene at 10 o'clock, and Rev. C. H. May will preside. The convention will close with a "World Wide Conquest." On Sunday morning a "quiet service" will be held at 9 o'clock.

New Sweden Plant Has Won More Prizes Than Any Other in World.

ST. PETER, MINN.—Fully 700 persons attended the anniversary of the New Sweden creamery yesterday afternoon. It was the tenth anniversary of the New Sweden creamery, and Secretary Anderson read a report showing that the company has earned \$250,000 since its organization. It has won more prizes than any other creamery in the world, and premiums received on its butter had more than paid the salaries of buttermakers and the cost of the plant.

The Nicollet County Creamery association held its annual meeting in connection, and for the first time re-elected Ole Peterson as its president. The other officers are: A. Russell, vice president; E. Anderson, secretary; F. D. Currier, treasurer.

Mrs. E. Anderson, secretary of the creamery, read a report of the creamery and the Nicollet County Good Roads association and Mr. Currier read a report of the creamery. Addresses were delivered by E. K. Slater, state dairy and food commissioner, Samuel Haugland, former champion buttermaker, George N. Olson of St. Peter and others.
