WOMAN WARS ON HARVESTER TRUST

Single-Handed She Seeks Vengeance and Charges Many Crooked Deals.

New York Sun Special Service. Chicago, June 21.—Following the discharge of her husband, Rodney B. Swift, from a position of trust with the International Harvester company, and the filing of a suit by the company against him charging Swift with fraud involving \$80,000, Mrs. Margaret G. Swift today filed a bill in chancery against the great concern, alleging tax dodging, corruption of legislators and city council members, receiving of \$1,000,000 in bribes, maintenance of a monopoly, overcharging for machinery, and misappropriation of funds for illegal and improper purposes.

SENDS POISON FOR DOOMED WOMAN

Unknown Mails Drug and Offer of \$2,000 if Jailor Will Cheat Noose.

KEEP NAME OF G. A. R.

Defendants of Civil War Soldiers Form an Organization.

Denver, June 21.—For the purpose of perpetuating the name of the Grand Army of the Republic, a society called the Sons of the Grand Army of the Republic has been organized in this city. One hundred are on the charter roll. The society will be extended to all cities and towns in the country as rapidly as possible. The requirement for membership is that a man must be a direct descendant of one who has fought in the civil war.
