## DR. COULTER JOINS DIVORCE COLONY

Special to the Journal. Sioux Falls, June 23.—Public attention continues to be directed to the matrimonial difficulties of Dr. Frank A. Coulter, a prominent physician of Omaha, who has become a member of the local divorce colony.

The kidnapping by Dr. Coulter of his two girls was a recent episode in connection with the case. Dr. Coulter called at the schoolhouse in Omaha, where the two little girls were pupils, and represented that he wished to take them out to lunch.

From what can be learned the kidnapped children are being kept at Canton, twenty miles south of Sioux Falls, in the residence of Mrs. Fanning, the father to see them frequently. Since the kidnapping Mrs. Coulter has received a letter from her husband, in which he has promised to return the girls to her, but she has refused to accept the offer.

It is fully believed here that this confirms the opinion that the children are being secreted in Canton, and that the case will be taken to Sioux Falls from a visit with them, mailed the letter in this city with the object of hoodluming Mrs. Coulter and the Omaha authorities.

About a year ago Dr. Coulter originally instituted an action for divorce in the court of Judge Day at Omaha. Mrs. Coulter contested the action and it was dismissed. Dr. Coulter then came to Sioux Falls, established a residence and in due time commenced divorce proceedings. The case was set for trial at the last term of court but for some reason was continued to the next term.

It is thought Dr. Coulter, fearing that the legality of his residence in Sioux Falls and South Dakota would be questioned, had the case continued to such a time as would enable him to cure such defects as might exist in his legal citizenship in South Dakota. He now maintains an office in this city.

At a special meeting of the city council the members of the Chicago syndicate which was recently granted a franchise for constructing and operating an electric street railway system in Sioux Falls furnished a bond of \$5,000 for the faithful performance of their contract. Members of the syndicate announced that the work will commence early in July and that five miles will be completed by Dec. 1.
