EGAN WANTS ELECTRIC LINE

South Dakota Town to Assist in Building Road.

Egan, S. D., June 29.—A large and enthusiastic meeting was held here Tuesday evening to consider the advisability of assisting in the construction of an electric railway from Brookings to South Dakota via Sioux Falls. Neil Stewart of Brookings outlined the policy of the promoters of the enterprise, and made clear the possible advantages to the town and county.

After discussion a committee of five was appointed to solicit subscriptions and secure the right-of-way from the county of Clark toward to the town line of Egan. A survey of the proposed line is to be made next week.

Another meeting of the citizens will be held in August, at which time the committee will be ready to report.

The promoters of the enterprise are eastern capitalists and a few citizens of Egan. It is proposed to have the line completed and ready for business before snow flies.

ITS FIRST TRAIN

La Crosse & Southeastern Railroad About Ready for Business.

La Crosse, Wis., June 29.—The first train of the La Crosse & Southeastern railroad arrived at La Crosse at 8:30 a.m. today. It ran over the entire road between this city and Virgo, a distance of about thirty miles. The train ran slowly owing to the new roadbed. There were several passengers aboard. Trains will be run regularly hereafter, two each way every day.

COST OF LAKE SHORE WRECK

Total Will Be Nearly a Million Dollars.

The Lake Shore wreck at Mentor, Ohio, will cost \$771,000, life insurance companies have paid \$100,000 and accident companies \$166,000. Life companies will pay \$150,000 more. The railroad will pay \$95,000 for nineteen deaths and other injuries sustained without litigation, will cost \$200,000. The engine loss is \$25,000 and the library car \$10,000. Adding repair, investigation and other expenses at \$25,000, the total is over three-quarters of a million dollars.

RAILROAD NOTES.

IMPROVEMENTS AT SCHRAP'S

Big Catering Establishment on Sixth Street Will Be Embellished to the Extent of \$15,000.

Extensive improvements are to be made at Schrap's, 32-34 Sixth street S. The success of the enterprise from its inception has been of such a nature that Mr. Schrap feels the necessity of extending the building on the rear 70 by 44 and the placing of a sanitary kitchen, strictly up to date and open for inspection at all times to any of the patrons. Special attention will be given to the ventilation, and when completed will be a revelation in its completeness to the smallest details. A balcony for orchestra is to be placed over the kitchen, facing the main room, and the new addition will be fitted up in modified empire style, with furnishings to match. The present working room will be fitted up as an oriental court for the entertainment of special parties, for which the need has been felt since the opening of this popular restaurant. The alterations will be done without interfering with business in any way, and all are to be completed in August. The architect, I. J. Bowler, is working on plans, and the intention is to commence the work in the neighborhood of \$15,000, and will be done by Schrap's own contracting firm. Schrap feels he can enter into his clientele with more success than ever.
