CONTRACT FOR MUNICIPAL GAS PLANT IS BINDING.

Council Balks by a Vote of Five to Five, but the Mayor Goes Ahead on His Own Responsibility and Appoints a Committee to Care for the Machinery.

IRON MOUNTAIN, MICH.—Alderman Broden Norway was the victim of a burglar who deprived him of an ear. His team ran away, overturning the wagon and hurrying him under it.

CRYSTAL FALLS, MICH.—Plans for the construction of the high school building here were accepted by the board of education. They will cost \$100,000 and will include a gymnasium, a library, a heating plant and plumbing, etc., etc.

DEATH AT ASHLAND, WIS., OF EDWIN S. BRINK.

A Friend of Booth, He Was Thrown Into Jail and Later Called Upon to Identify the Assassin—A Prisoner of the United States for Over Three Months.

Special to The Journal. Ashland, Wis., July 5.—Edwin S. Brink, an intimate acquaintance of Booth, the assassin of President Lincoln, is dead here. He was 78 and a veteran of the civil war.

STATE CONVENTION OF "BOES" Vanguard of Sixteen Locked Up at Madison, Wis.

MADISON, WIS.—Sixteen "Wearry Willies" were arrested and held up in jail one day this week. The police say the gathering was the vanguard of the state convention of boobies scheduled to meet at Madison July 16.

STURGIS, S. D.—John Martin, 40 years old, was lying on the railroad track when a freight engine struck him on the head, tearing off his entire scalp. He is still unconscious.

CELEBRATIONS IN THE NORTHWEST

LAKOTA HAS ITS FIRST ONE IN TWELVE YEARS. Rain Spoiled the Program at Several Points, but in the Majority the Exercises Were Carried Out Between the Showers—Big Parade at Winona.

Special to The Journal. Lakota, S. D., July 5.—Five thousand persons attended the celebration here yesterday; the first held in twelve years. Several heavy showers interfered with the program, but the day passed without accident to anyone. The parade in the morning was a pleasing feature. Ball games were played between Lakota and Northwood, the teams breaking even. Senator Hanson spoke to several thousand on the courthouse grounds and was listened to with much interest, although the speech was not touched upon.

STOCKHOLM, WIS.—The Lutheran congregation of Lake City, Minn., with the Synod Lutheran and Maryland Mission congregations, all Swedish, joined the Swedish mission congregation of the unfavorable weather. A first parade and an eloquent address by Dar Reese of St. Paul, were features.

The feature of the day was a flag raising by the Chicago & North-Western railway employees, with an address by Colonel Stewart. An immense crowd was in attendance. The celebration closed with a grand display of fireworks.

NEW RICHMOND, WIS.—Rain interfered with the execution of the splendidly arranged program for Independence day in this city and several neighboring towns. Here the entire afternoon program of ball games and races was abandoned.

WINONA, MINN.—Winona celebrated the Fourth, the program being under the auspices of the Trades and Labor council. There was a big parade in the morning with public exercises. Ex-Mayor D. A. Stewart presided. Judge Puck read the Declaration of Independence and there were addresses by ex-Governor Van Sant, Cook, Congressman Tawney, Senator Fitzpatrick and W. B. Anderson. There was a big fireworks display in the evening.

BLACK RIVER FALLS, WIS.—By dodging showers a large part of the Fourth's program was carried out. Opera hall took the place of the park for speeches and other exercises.

LAW HAS UPPER HAND. Lawrence County Saloons Believed to Have Been Given a Lasting Blow.

LEAD, S. D.—Mayor John Gilroy, accompanied by the chief of police, closed all the dance halls and bars in connection with them. This order followed closely upon the county order concerning gambling and saloon regulations. The mayor says that these places must remain closed permanently and that the houses in connection with them will not be permitted to sell intoxicating drinks.

DEADWOOD, S. D.—The Mansion and the Totten, two of the largest saloons here, closed the first of this month, their owners failing to take out license. Three saloons in Lead have followed their lead and it looks as though the liquor business in Lawrence county had suffered a lasting blow from the action of the county authorities.
