**OLD, OLD GAME FAILED TO WORK**  
Footrace Swindle Game Near Going Thru at Joliet, Ill.

Joliet, Ill., July 12.—Detectives working on Joliet election frauds have unearthed a \$10,000 footrace swindle game that was being pulled off here the week following last election. The chief was to Abilene, Kan., where F. L. Ball, who was known to have been in Joliet on election day, is day clerk in the Union Pacific hotel.

Detective Murphy went to Abilene Saturday to put Ball in the sweat-box in the hope of securing information as to the swindle and identification of the men who tampered with ballots here.

According to Ball's story, "Doughnuts" Termer, a well-known Chicago character; James Gorman, a prizefighter; T. C. Este, owner of a hotel in Abilene; and three Joliet men whose names are suppressed, planned to pull off a fake race. Ball, with \$10,000 check in his pocket, arrived in Joliet and learned that Ball was to be "doughnut-crowded."

A few days and the three left town suddenly. While he was here one of the Joliet men placed \$25,000 on a table in the hotel room just to prove that everything was on the level, but the Kansas man would not be convinced.

Ball is the man who took charge of the Dever ranch in Kansas after the murders and, single-handed, disarmed the cowboys. He is said to have informed detectives that Termer has been affiliating with a western crowd of footracers that has cleaned up \$250,000 in the past five years.

**JOE KELLEY WILL PUT UP FIGHT**  
Says He Will Follow in the Footsteps of the Illustrious McGraw.

Boston, July 12.—Manager Joe Kelley of the Cincinnati team intends to make a fight of President Pullman of the National league and sends or fines him as a result of his trouble with Empire Baseball club, where he is manager.

"If President Pullman leans unjustly with me in my trial which comes off this afternoon, I will take the case to court, as did McGraw. I will not attend the hearing, as Pullman wrote and intimated my presence was not needed, and that a statement would do as well."

The charges of Empire Baseball against Kelley will come up before Judge Pillsbury in New York. This is the first instance in the history of the league where a player has appeared before the president to answer charges during the playing season.

Much interest is centered in the case, as it will test the validity of the recent court ruling of Judge Sheldon of Boston, who declared that a president is a trustee and could not sue a player or suspend him without trial.
