EASTSIDERS EAGER TO JOIN THE NEW COMMERCIAL CLUB.

Turner.

The thing to be considered after the location of the club is the equipment, and the following were appointed to investigate this matter and procure donations: W. F. Washburn, chairman; Raymond Waterman, M. H. Aamodt, D. C. Craig, Jean Satterlee, Fred Bombach and Carl Schober.

Every one of the thirty representative business men who attended the meeting promised to obtain five applications during the week. News of the club is spreading and there are many inquiries every day as to its purpose and intent. The members are very enthusiastic over the success that has come, even in the short time the club has been organized, and realizing what a benefit it will be to the members and to the East Side, they are making every effort to give all their friends an opportunity to join.

SCHULER & NARY BUILD A. O. U. W. OF NEW BOSTON WANT PRIZE

WILL MOVE INTO FINE NEW STORE ON UNIVERSITY AVENUE IN AUGUST.

"There is no flat above the building?" queried the reporter. "No, I should say not," was the rejoinder. "We will have enough to keep us busy right in this plumbing shop. If any one deserves to get to heaven, plumbers do."

Consequently there will be no flat above the new building which Schuler & Nary are putting up on University avenue just off from Central. The building has been especially designed to meet the needs of a plumbing shop. It is 20x80, built of brick with a front of pressed brick. It will be fitted up with plate glass windows in the front, which will both afford plenty of light, but also furnish a good place to display the best plumber's goods.

The showroom will occupy the front of the building and will include about 20x30 feet. Here will be kept a full line of up-to-date plumber's goods for the inspection of the house builder and those who are planning to replace old plumbing already in their homes. The space back of the display room, where the offices will be, is to be used as a shop room, 50x60 feet after cramped quarters are almost prodigal supply of room.

For ten years Schuler & Nary have been in business at 1212 Central avenue, but this year they have been induced to build for themselves as the owners of the block they now occupy intend to tear down the block and build better stores on the site. In the new location, which they will occupy after Aug. 1, they will have a number of advantages, more room, large back yard, facilities to display their goods, and a building entirely new, light and well ventilated in a good location, just off Central avenue on a much-traveled thoroughfare.

CRACKED CURBS ARE TAKEN OUT

The new paving will be a concrete block on a firm and lasting foundation of concrete. This is no experiment in the way of street paving, for it has been tried with the best of success. Central avenue, before 4 o'clock Thursday afternoon of each week, will hardly be recognized.

East Side business men have wanted the new paving on the street for years, but it was only in the last two years that an organization of business men has been formed which was able to demand improvements and get them. Since the formation of the organization, a marked impetus has been felt in East Side business. The new paving will be but another step in the permanent prosperity of the East Side. The merchants all along the avenue are looking forward to its completion as the time when the avenue will look as it should—indicative of the flourishing business along the street.


