DANIEL S. LAMONT DIES SUDDENLY

Private Secretary of Cleveland as President Succumbs to Heart Failure.

New York Sun Special Service.
Millbrook, N. Y., July 24.—Colonel Daniel S. Lamont, who first became nationally famous as private secretary to President Cleveland, died suddenly in his country home here at 9:15 p.m. yesterday.
The fatal illness was so brief that it started even the medical men attending him.
Colonel and Mrs. Lamont were out driving yesterday afternoon and Colonel Lamont appeared to be enjoying the best of health. After dinner he complained of feeling ill and Dr. Stewart of New York, who is a guest at the house, immediately went to his aid.
Heart Failure the Cause.
The physician diagnosed the case as an attack of heart failure, and in spite of the heroic treatment, Mr. Lamont passed away within half an hour. At his death were Mrs. Lamont and two daughters, Frances and Bessie. Several guests at the Lamont home were also present when he died.
Colonel Lamont had been in feeble health and the members of the immediate family were gathered at the Millbrook, the Lamont country home at Millbrook, intelligence of the approaching death of Colonel Lamont was sent earlier in the evening to Dr. Joseph D. Bryant of New York, a lifelong friend

Lamont's Career.

Daniel S. Lamont was born in McGrawville, Cortland county, N. Y., Feb. 9, 1851. He came of Scotch-Irish ancestry, who emigrated to this country and became farmers. His father was successful, and the boy, after studying at the normal college of his home town, was sent to Union college, Schenectady, but did not graduate.
He left college to take up newspaper work, for which he had both inclination and talent. He purchased an interest in the Democrat, a paper published in the county seat of Cortland county, and became its editor, at the same time interesting himself in politics.
In 1870 he was appointed engraving clerk of the New York state assembly, and was chief clerk in the office of the secretary of state with John Bigelow. For a time he held a position on the staff of the Albany Argus, and he thus became well known to many of the most influential politicians of the state.
He Enters Politics.
When Grover Cleveland was elected governor of New York he met young Lamont, and having occasion to make use of his knowledge and ability in the preparation of his first message, offered him an honorary position on his military staff, which gave him the title of colonel.
Governor Cleveland next appointed Mr. Lamont his private secretary, in which position he made himself so useful that when Mr. Cleveland became president he took Mr. Lamont with him to the White House.
At the beginning of the second Cleveland administration in 1893, he was appointed secretary of war, giving up extensive interests to serve in that position.
At the request of William C. Whitney and Oliver H. Payne he had gone into the Metropolitan Traction company in 1899. Later he became vice president of the Northern Pacific.

Duluth, July 24.—The ravages of high water in the territory about Aitkin, as a result of the Mississippi river overflowing its banks, have not been exaggerated," said Congressman J. Adam Bede.
Commissioner Williams says that in his estimation \$25,000 will be required to meet the emergency.
At a meeting held in Aitkin it was resolved to ask congress to dig a ditch from Waldeck, above Aitkin, to Pine Knoll, below Aitkin, a distance of nine miles, to relieve the river of much of its surplus water in time of freshets.
Promises to Help.
Congressman Bede said: "I understand that this proposition to help care for the surplus water has been considered in past years, and that even a survey has been made. The plans were supposed at that time to call for

A Windstorm Kills Two Men and Does \$10,000 Damage.
Racine, Wis., July 24.—A windstorm struck the northern part of Racine county Saturday, killing two men and injuring the crops to the extent of \$10,000.
The cyclone came from the southwest, and at its first dip struck the large barn of Adolph Meisner, which was torn to pieces, the debris, with grain and farm machines, being scattered 200 feet.
At least a dozen cattle were killed and the telephone wires in the district were blown down.
At a farm in Thompsonville a workman, whose name was not known, was struck and killed.
Near Union Grove Adam Hunter, an old farmer, was picked up by the storm and his neck was broken.
