

UNCLE SAM MAY PRINT A PAPER

Official Gazette for Publication of Governmental Announcements Is Projected.

Washington, July 25.—The government may begin the publication of an official gazette as the result of the present investigation of methods in the executive departments.

Among other things, such a publication would carry all official notices, such as advertisements for bids for all public work and all official army and navy orders.

The investigation which is now going on of methods in the statistical bureau of the agricultural department only adds one more to a long list of investigations undertaken since Roosevelt became president.

The postoffice department, for example, is still following the model made for it in 1790. There have been some improvements, but in the main the old system prevails and gives tone to the whole department.

The chief obstacle to reform in the departments is the antiquated clerk who has been in office many years, and who works today just as it was done when he first became a government employe.

In the Statistical Bureau. There is a condition of rottenness and rascality in the statistical bureau of the agricultural department; elsewhere for the most part the chief criticism is that the system in vogue is one that passed out of use long before the civil war, and that it is cumbersome and expensive, when measured by systems of the present day.

Assistant Secretary Hays has worked out a splendid solution of the crop report problem, and already the statistical bureau over which John Hyde so long presided is in better form than ever before in its history.

Hyde was entirely honest, and in addition he was competent; but he was entirely lacking in system and order. He did his own work properly, but seemed to have no faculty of making his numerous subordinates do their work in a similar way.

NEW YORK'S POOR INCREASING FAST

Percentage in Public Institutions to the Population 8.69 Last Year.

New York Sun Special Service. Albany, N. Y., July 26.—According to statistics compiled by the state board of charities, the poor of New York city have increased rapidly in the past three years.

New York city is spending more than \$2,000,000 a year for public institutions devoted to the relief of the poor. In 1875 the amount was \$633,364, while in 1904 it was \$2,059,237.
