MINNETONKA RAILROADS

500 LINE MAY COMPETE AGAIN

Secretary Bonaparte Decides It May Bid for Carrying Naval Supplies.

Washington, July 27.—Secretary Bonaparte has signed an order restoring to American railways having Canadian connections the right to compete for the carrying of naval supplies to coast points. This order will operate to benefit the Boston & Maine and the Soo lines.

While Secretary Morton was in office he decided that these roads, on account of the connections, ought not to transport these supplies. The result was to give all this business to the American lines. Bonaparte has restored matters to the old basis.

RAILROAD NOTES.

Official resignation of J. D. Farrell as president of the Great Northern Steamship company has been received on account of ill health. Howard Jones, slated as a successor, has gone to New York to confer with J. J. Hill.

Topeka, Kan.—It is understood that Frank Nolan, general superintendent of the Texas, Fort Worth & Denver City railway, has been selected to succeed J. O. Crockett, who resigned as general superintendent of the line.

Withdrawal of the opposition of the Sioux City, Homer & Southern road to the Great Northern-Burlington line, and the Chicago & North Western, crossing the Winago reservation, removes the last obstacle, and the line will be in use before fall.

The state railroad and warehouse commission yesterday inspected an interlocking plant at crossing of the bridge across the Minneapolis Union lines, Fifteenth avenue SE. This is in pursuance with a law that an interlocking plant must be inspected before a certificate is granted for its operation.

New York.—The directors of the Erie Railroad company have declared a dividend of 4 percent on Erie second preferred and the regular semi-annual dividend of 2 percent on the first preferred stock, driving the second preferred stock is payable in two installments, the first in September and the second in April, 1906.

READY FOR FIGHT FOR RESERVOIRS

Representative Stevens Hopes to Show Congress the River System Is Necessary.

Washington, July 27.—Since coming to Washington, Representative Stevens of St. Paul has been made aware of the fact that the opposition in the north-west to the proposed dam across the upper Mississippi river is preparing to make itself felt in congress next session.

The attack on the system will probably take the form of a joint resolution to be introduced in the house, regulating the flow of water from the reservoirs. This "resolution" will, of course, be of a character to destroy the usefulness of the reservoirs.

Mr. Stevens is enlisted for the war, and when congress meets he will take off his coat and go to work. He seems to be of a character to destroy the usefulness of the reservoirs, he still believes that when the situation is explained to the leading members of congress the passage of any "resolution" will be quite out of the question. He thinks that the arguments are altogether with those who believe that the reservoirs should stand, and while there will be a divided delegation from Minnesota, that the reservoirs will be permitted to stand.

Board Is Unbiased.

Mr. Stevens speaks in high terms of the board of army officers appointed to investigate and report to the war department. The board is disinterested, and its report will be unprejudiced. The report will be made in the late fall, probably after an exhaustive study of the case on the ground this summer and fall. Should the report be favorable to the reservoirs, congress will be very unlikely to interpose any objections.

Yesterday and today Mr. Stevens has talked over the reservoir question with army officers of the engineering corps, and before he goes away he will have the entire case laid before the department, as seen from his point of view.

The Lighting Question.

He will not, for the present, push the question of having the surplus power generated by the Meeker Island dam used for lighting the twin cities. This question must now wait until the reservoir question is out of the way. At the proper time, however, it will be taken up. When that time comes, congressional action will be necessary. There will be a board of inquiry similar to that just appointed to inquire about the reservoirs, and if its report is favorable, the question will be passed up to congress, which will be asked to consent to municipal use of the surplus power at the dam.

Fort Snelling will probably never use more than about 3,500-horsepower and the dam will generate a total of about 12,000-horsepower, or quite enough, it is believed, to light every street of both cities.

Plans for Snelling.

Mr. Stevens has some plans in mind for additional buildings at Fort Snelling, but these will go over until the reservoir and Fort Snelling bridge matters have been disposed of. The outlook for the bridge is very hopeful, and Mr. Stevens believes an appropriation can be had from congress, notwithstanding the depleted condition of the treasury. This will be made possible by the fact that the \$75,000 to be set aside as the government share of the cost of the bridge, will not be called for for several years, by which time federal

TENANTS COMBINE TO FIGHT RACE SUICIDE

New York Sun Special Service.

Cleveland, Ohio, July 27.—The Tenants' Protective association, composed of house-renters, has been formed to combat the purpose of the landlords' association, recently organized, and to wage a crusade against race suicide. Landlords who bar colored children from their tenements are blacklisted. Other objects of the new association are:

To protect tenants from injustice and persecution at the hands of landlords and agents.

To keep a list for the use of members only of those landlords or agents who secure tenants by misrepresenting conditions of the premises or by promises of repairs, etc., which promises they fail to perform.

To secure the enforcement of sanitary and inspection laws.

To secure the enactment of such laws as are needed to protect the health and lives of tenants.

The association has also under consideration a fund to assist tenants temporarily embarrassed.
