RECEIVERS SOUGHT FOR EQUITABLE

Grave Charges Made in Action Taken Against the Big Insurance Company.

New York, July 28.—In the form of an amended complaint to a bill filed last April, suit was begun today in the United States circuit court for the southern New York district to throw the entire \$421,000,000 of the assets of the Equitable Life Assurance society into the hands of receivers, who shall take possession of all the funds assets and property held by the defendant society of every character and description, and administer the same as they may be directed by the court.

More than forty policyholders in the Equitable, representing a dozen different states, are included as complainants in the present suit, which is based in part upon the allegation that the society has no funds with which to meet its enormous losses and is insolvent.

With J. Wilcox Brown of Maryland, the holder of a \$25,000 policy, as complainant, papers were filed last April to compel the management to account for the policy holders, and for the appointment of receivers for the surplus funds pending judicial ascertainment of the rights of the policy holders thereto.

Grave Charges Made.

In the amended bill, which is far more sweeping in its charges and in its appeal for relief than was the original bill of last April, there are incorporated many citations from the reports of the various newspapers published some months later. The bill alleges that the society has been guilty of mismanagement in syndicate transactions; that "unreasonable and excessive salaries have been paid, and that large sums of money, ranging from \$20,000 to \$37,000,000, belonging to the said insurance fund of the society, were loaned to remain uninvested on deposit in banks and trust companies, without adequate interest, in many of which banks and trust companies the said directors and officers and directors of the society, many of them, were large stockholders, for the purpose of securing pecuniary benefit to such officers and directors individually; and such undue and unreasonable cash balances existed since at least the year 1900."

The Ryan Purchase.

Reciting the purchase of the Hyde stock by Thomas F. Ryan, the complaint then denies the legality of the election of directors who are not stockholders of the society. The complaint goes on:

"The assurance funds held by the society have been fraudulently and neglectfully used and are being wasted and mismanaged and lost to the extent of many millions of dollars; it is without a legal or equitable basis of directors, and the real value of the property held by it is unknown and speculative."

Declared Unable to Pay.

Reverting to a statement that the defendant society "has willfully and neglectfully and fraudulently mismanaged and thru its officers and agents misappropriated the said assurance funds," the complaint asserts that "the said defendant is wholly unable to repay the amount of such wasted and misappropriated moneys to said fund for the benefit of your annuitants, and your directors, and that said defendant is wholly insolvent in consequence thereof."

Waste and Fraud.

It is further added that "the property of the defendants is now in the hands, or under the control, of the stockholders whose representatives have been guilty of misappropriation, waste, fraud and neglect in the management of its affairs and property. The business and affairs of the society are at a standstill; its morale as an insurer is destroyed; whatever business it may do will be at an enormous loss and sacrifice on the part of the present policyholders. Their supreme interest is to place the assets in the hands of competent receivers to be sold by the court, and to gradually, prudently and economically wind up the affairs of the company. In this way only can the policyholders and annuitants be protected from eventual and irremediable loss."

What Is Asked.

It is asked that an accounting be taken, under the direction of the court, of all dealings and transactions of the society, its officers, agents and stockholders in and about the funds received and held by the society, realized from the premiums paid by policyholders and annuitants, and that the accountants be charged with the duty of ascertaining to what extent the society is indebted to the fund so derived, on account of damages, losses and depletions occasioned by its negligence, mismanagement, misappropriation and other causes averred in the said bill and this amended bill.

Now Mutual Reserve.

Another Life Insurance Company Faces Charges of Fraud.

Albany, July 28.—Concealments of judgments against the company amounting to \$182,767, exaggeration of its surplus by over \$300,000 and a fixed policy of delay in settling claims are some of the charges made against the Mutual Reserve Life Insurance company by Chief Examiner Isaac Vanderpool in his report to State Superintendent of Insurance Hendricks.

The examination was begun last December and covers a period back to 1899. The company has headquarters in New York city claims assets of between \$5,000,000 and \$6,000,000.

Examiner Vanderpool says the management of the company made no mention of these judgments in the item of its liabilities reported for 1904.

Beneficiaries Get Little.

The report shows in detail how insurance amounting to at one time \$1,923,000.73 finally yielded its beneficiaries \$906,656.74, there having been deducted \$2,965,343 on account of an indebtedness ascertained by the company's examiners against the assured, with a further deduction of \$722,686.69 retained by the company for the various alleged violations of contract by the insured.

"Making due allowance for the time it may occupy to investigate all questionable death claims," says the examiner, "I think that it is quite clearly in evidence that the company has adopted a settled policy of delay in all claims under policies or certificates issued. From the date of such approval, ninety days is the specified time within which payment is to be made. The average period elapsing between the filing of proofs of death, which were upon investigation ultimately found to be valid claims, is so lengthy as to properly to subject the company to the severest criticism."

Sinking Fund Wiped Out.

In 1895 the department recommended that the company establish a sinking fund to offset the depreciation

BUY BARLEY FOR EXPORT

NEW TRADE PROMISES TO DEVELOPE INTO PROMINENT FEATURE OF LOCAL GRAIN MARKET.

The first car of new-crop Minnesota barley sold in the Minneapolis market was taken by Ely Bernays, the New York exporter, who is now in Minneapolis. It came from Northfield to the Calumet Elevator company, graded No. 4, and sold for 41c. The presence on 'change here of Mr. Bernays, and his purchase of the first of the new stuff to move, occasioned some comment as to the probability of a big export trade this year. Much will depend upon the competition of Russia, but if an export price basis be reached that will permit American exporters to compete, a large business will follow, with Minneapolis as point of origin.

Mr. Bernays is the first of the large seaboard buyers to turn permanently to Minneapolis, but, with the northward and westward shifting of the center of production, necessity will compel the New York export houses to come into closer touch. Mr. Bernays is inclined to the view that a position of predominance in primary affairs, in barley, is shaping for Minneapolis.
