**NEW PHASE IN APPLE DAM CASE**

**DECISION FAVORABLE TO McDOWGALD vs. NEW RICHMOND MILLS**

Argument on a Motion for Abatement of the Dam Across the Apple River Near Star Prairie, Wis., Will Be Heard in the Near Future.

Special to The Journal. Hudson, Wis., Aug. 5.—The case of McDougald vs. New Richmond roller mills came to a close at 5 o'clock yesterday, when the jury rendered a verdict favorable to the plaintiff.

The twelve men decided that if the court should decide that the dam, built across the Apple river below the McDougald estate in Star Prairie, Wis., is a nuisance, then the dam should be abated and \$100 in damages be allowed the plaintiff; or, if the dam should be permitted to stand as at present, then the plaintiff should be allowed \$300 in damages.

In accordance with the first finding of the jury, Senator James A. Frear, in behalf of the plaintiff, moved for the abatement of the dam, and Judge Trautman of Milwaukee, who is trying the case for Judge Heims of this circuit, will hear the arguments of the counsel on this motion in the near future.

This controversy involves some very complicated legal questions and has been watched with the keenest interest in northwestern Wisconsin. It arose in 1903, when the New Richmond Roller Mills company built a dam on the Apple river in Star Prairie, Wis., to furnish power for an electric plant, thus causing the stream to submerge a part of the McDougald estate and form a stagnant pool close to the McDougald home.

Charles McDougald, who held a life interest in the estate, began proceedings in the circuit court to compel the abatement of the dam, but he was allowed only \$200 in damages. The case went to the state supreme court, which modified the judgment of the lower court, but failed to satisfy the plaintiff's demands.

Then Senator James A. Frear of Hudson, McDougald's attorney, began action in the circuit court against the milling company, on behalf of the children of Charles McDougald, the real owners of the damaged property, and this is the action just tried.

**GARBAGE USED FOR CITY FUEL**

**IOWA MAN PATENTS A METHOD OF BURNING IT.**

Unslacked Lime, Water and Coal Tar Used to Make a Mixture that Blazes Fiercely—Cost Is About \$1 for 3,000 Pounds of Garbage.

Special to The Journal. Marshalltown, Iowa, Aug. 5.—The town of Mesa in Jasper county, may be the slowest in a method of garbage disposal that promises to revolutionize the business and prove a boon to cities and towns.

At a ridiculously low figure it is claimed the city's garbage can be converted into fuel for use in the city's pumping station. The garbage is converted into fuel by the aid of lime, coal tar and coal slack.



**GLAPP'S DRAINAGE IDEA MAKES HIT**

**NORTHERN MINNESOTA POINTS MUCH IMPRESSED.**

Some of the Points in the New Constitution Adopted by the State Drainage League in Its Recent Meeting at Crookston—Annual Pamphlets to Be Sent Out.

Special to The Journal. Crookston, Minn., Aug. 5.—The constitution adopted by the State Drainage League at its recent meeting gives the purposes of the league, its aims and the general management of the league are to collect and distribute information relating to the benefits to be obtained from scientific drainage of the swamp lands, to secure thru the legislature such changes to existing drainage laws as shall be found necessary, to expedite appropriations to secure from the national government appropriations, to secure state appropriations, to assist and promote the survey of the lands to be sold or disposed of.

Senator Clapp's idea of a reimbursable fund to be made by the federal government for the purpose of reclaiming the greater portion of the Indian and forest reserves, as well as the public lands in northern Minnesota, created a decided impression thru this section, and the national legislators will undoubtedly at the next meeting of congress endeavor to secure such a piece of legislation. The senator's idea is to return the money expended for drainage by the government, after the lands have been sold or disposed of.

The new constitution provides for three special committees, as follows: On legislative, on judicial and on field work. The membership fee is to be \$1 per annum. The constitution may be amended at any time by a majority vote of the members present at any regular meeting. A quorum of the executive committee shall consist of seven members, and ten members of the league shall constitute a quorum at any regular or called meeting. The secretary of the league is to allow a compensation of 10 per cent of all moneys received by the league, and shall further be reimbursed as to postage and express. The reports of each meeting are to be stenographically reported and published in pamphlet form.

**An Average of Twenty-five Pounds of Copper to the Ton Is Expected.**

CALUMET, MICH.—This week marked the entrance of the Allouez mine into the producing class. Development work has been carried forward to such a stage that regular shipments are likely to be continued at the rate of 250 tons daily for the next few months. Openings at the Allouez show a highly mineralized body from the first to the fourth levels inclusive. The shaft is sinking to the fifth level, and lateral openings at any time will be possible within a few weeks. There is a large quantity of rich rock on surface, and shipments will be made from this source as well as the underground openings. While too much stress should not be laid upon the result of the Allouez's first week's mill run, it is confidently expected that it will show an average of at least twenty-five pounds of fine copper to the ton of rock stamped.

PIERRE, S. D.—The department has in the first six months of the present year placed \$354,501 of the permanent school fund. **"CATTLE DIPPING CASE"**

**The Decision of Judge Whiting as to the Proper Authority.**

FURON, S. D.—The decision of Judge Whiting, in the "cattle-dipping case," is received with much interest. He holds that the state has the right to declare quarantine against a county where the cattle are infected and where the facts warrant, and that the board has no authority to make an order requiring the county inspector to dip cattle or have them dipped. The state has a supervisory power in the state board over the county board, and the latter has no power to do anything necessary to protect cattle in his county, but can only require cattle to be dipped where he has made an inspection and found them diseased.

MILBANK, S. D.—Hentley's new opera house here is complete. The promise that it would be the prettiest theater in the state is fully realized. Special attention has been given to the stage, which is 30x50 feet and high enough to permit the scenery to be handled from galleries on either side. The opera house will be managed by Mr. Bentley. The theater will be opened Nov. 1.
