NEW LAND BOOM

SOUTH DAKOTA WILL GAIN AT EXPENSE OF MIDDLE STATES.

Census Shows the Drain to Which Iowa Has Been Subjected the Past Five Years - Farmers of the Northwest Have Never Shifted So Rapidly Before.

Sioux City, Iowa, Aug. 11.—Iowa, Nebraska, Illinois and Indiana will all feel the exodus of farmers to the new lands being opened in South Dakota, according to Captain J. F. Merry, general immigration agent of the Illinois Central railroad. Captain Merry says South Dakota is on the verge of an old-fashioned land boom. lowa has just completed a census which shows that most counties have lost in population Many good farm houses are empty, the land ir lowa has been rented or sold to those who wish

Many good farm houses are empty, the land it lowa has been rented or sold to those who wish to hold it, and the farmer and his family of hawkeye-born children have moved to the Dakotas to get new and cheaper land. Farmers were never shifting so rapidly in the northwest, declares Captain Merry.

Iowa is not left because there is anything wrong with it, but because the farmers have the notion that it is wise for them to sell at big prices and buy in South Dakota at low prices. In the meanwhile, the movement of farmers from the Dakotas across the border to Canada has already begun, and it is declared there are many vacancies of this kind to fill. The United Fruit company, better known as the banana trust, has decided to open at Sioux City the only branch between Kansas City and Minneapolis. It is expected that 1,800 cars of bananas, to say nothing of other fruit, will be distributed from here.

CITIZENS WILL DIG Rapid City Men Will Search for Gas, Coal and Oil.

RAPID CITY, S. D.—Experts have been confident for some time that natural gas, coal, oil and an artesian basin underlay the ground in the vicinity of this city. It was their theory that these constituents could be found in a comparatively short distance. This belief has also been held by many of the capitalists of Rapid City, who are now going to demonstrate their faith by sinking.

The matter has been taken up by a local company with plenty of capital. Mr. McCain, an expert driller, has been ergaged and will superintend the work. The North-Western company, will be asked to ship the tools and machinery, free of charge, as its contribution to this industry. The Commercial club took action upon the matter and agreed to work in harmony with the new organization. The company will drill for gas, oil and coal and will be prepared also to take care of any artesian flow of water which may be encountered. Work will begin as soon as the machinery is on the ground.

A meeting of the stockholders of the Rapid City, Missouri River & St. Paul Railroad company will be held on the 24th, to act upon the proposition recently made, it is understood, by the North-Western Railroad company, in which it proposes to buy the company's property for \$40,000. The assets of the company consist of the right of way from Rapid City to Cheyenne River and about seventy-five miles of graded roadway.

NEW OFFICIALS FOR WINONA Municipal Works Board Will Be Estab. lished in April.

WINONA, MINN.—Since Winona's population has been officially anonunced to be in excess of 20,000, it is known that a board of municipal works will be established here next April. This was provided for in a law passed by the legistature of 1903 applicable to cities of from 20,000 to 50,000 inhabitants. This board wil imanage the waterworks and sewerage pumping plants. It is to be non-partizan and of six members appointed by the mayor.

Captain W. A. Thompson, in charge of river improvement work in the district below Winona, began work on Wednesday with 300 men, two steamers and two quarter boats.

The work is now confined to the wing dama and shore protection just north of the Eagle Bluff summer resort and to the quaries at La Moille. A complete crew is at work at the quarries taking out rock for the season's improvement in this district.

The 300 men constitute one of the largest crews put into service on the river. The long delay caused by high water has made it necessary to put out all the laborers available.

The steamers Elsie and Alert are busy in this district, towing the barges of rock from La Moille to the scene of operations near Egle Bluff.

The intention of Captain Thompson is to complete the work there and finish the small operations opposite the La Crosse harbor on the shore of Pettibone island, and them take up repairs in the southern part of the district, south of La Crosse.
