## NORTHWEST MINNESOTA BUCK LACKS BAIL; STILL IN A CELL

### SURRENDERS IDEA OF OBTAINING SIGNERS AT MAPLETON.

Some Who Seemed Ready to Help Him at First Are Now Holding Back—Effort Under Way to Settle the Claims Against Judge Ogle and Save Him from Prosecution.

Back has not yet furnished the \$5,000 bail for his appearance at the November term of the district court, although efforts are being made to get signers to the bonds. The only remaining signers at Mapleton has been abandoned. It is understood that some who were free with offers to sign had not yet received the opportunity to do so, or were found not to be qualified. Several persons have offered to sign for limited amounts, such as \$100 each.

### BEARS DATE OF REVOLUTION

Rare Locket Found a Few Inches Under Ground at Red Wing.

RED WING, MINN.—Bert Hilde, while digging the old site of the trading post property on Sixth street, found a relic of the time of the revolution. While digging a few inches below the surface of the ground, he was attracted by a glimmering bit of yellow metal buried in the dirt. He dug it up, he picked up a rare locket of old gold. Upon one side were some unknown designs, probably of a mark or seal of a secret society, and on the opposite side appeared the name of "Horace Wilder" and the date "1776."

## MRS. RAND'S HEIRS WILL CONTEST

### BULK OF HER FORTUNE GIVEN TO MRS. HERRON.

Professor Herron's Divorce and Second Marriage and His Expulsion from a Chair of Iowa College at Grinnell Recalled by Death of His Mother-in-Law in Italy.

Special to The Journal. Marshalltown, Iowa, Aug. 16.—A dispatch from Grinnell says it is learned that the bulk of Mrs. Rand's fortune has been willed to Mrs. G. D. Herron, wife of Professor Herron and daughter of the dead woman. Mrs. Rand, it will be remembered, died in Italy, and a few days ago Mr. and Mrs. Herron returned to Burlington with her ashes for burial.

It is said the other heirs will contest the will. They are a brother of Mrs. Rand's husband, who died many years ago and the children of another brother deceased. It is said that Mrs. Rand paid Professor Herron's first wife, whom he divorced in order that he might marry Carl Rand, \$40,000 as alimony.

Herron's peculiar views on marriage caused a scandal in Iowa college and he was expelled from the chair of applied Christianity, which Mrs. Rand endorsed on the express terms that it should be accepted by Herron, and was asked to withdraw from the Congregational church, of which she was an ordained minister. ### LEMERE TRIES TO DIE

### SCION OF WEALTHY NEW JERSEY FAMILY TAKES POISON IN A CROOKSTON JAIL

Crookston, Minn., Aug. 16.—Bound over to the grand jury by Judge Bishop of Thief River Falls for taking indecent liberties with a girl, Miss Ella Sanford of that place, Frank Lemer, a hotelman, who attended the recent Red Lake county fair, last evening attempted to commit suicide by taking a large dose of poison. The attempt was frustrated by the timely arrival of the police and the injection of an emetic. The case in which Lemer is involved is the sensation of the hour at Thief River. He was arrested several days ago upon the complaint of the Sanford girl's mother that the child was with Lemer in his room over a saloon. At the trial the girl, who is but 15, told of what had occurred in the two days in which she was in the showman's company, the evidence making a shocking story.

Lemer did not deny the truth of the girl's statements and was bound over. He is from Paterson, N. J., and is believed to be the runaway son of wealthy parents. The disgrace of the fair was too great a strain upon him and he endeavored by strychnine to end his troubles.

### DARK CRIMES SUSPECTED

Missing Northern Michigan Men Believed to Have Been Murdered.

ESKANABA, MICH.—Searchers who have been hunting thru the woods in Houghton township in an attempt to find Norman Williams, who disappeared from his home Aug. 8, believe he was murdered for the small sum of money which he carried, and his body secured.

### STAKED OUT FOR SEVEN MILES

Diamond Drill Borings Cause Great Excitement at Lewiston.

LEWISTON, MONT.—Great excitement has resulted from diamond drill borings made at the head of Dog creek, one mile north of Kendall. Some rich crystals and a vein of oil are said to have been struck and the country has been staked out for seven miles, cruisers even bring upon ranches and other patented ground. Maiden mining camp, about sixteen miles north of Lewiston, sustained heavy damage by fire today, a large portion of the business section, consisting of frame buildings, being destroyed. The loss is \$50,000.
