The singing of Danish songs, the observance of Danish holidays, the sending of children to schools in Denmark, in fact, any act indicating a regard for anything Danish has been punishable by penalties from fine and imprisonment to banishment and confiscation of property.

BLOW FOR PRIVATE CARS

THE TEXAS RAILROAD COMMISSION KNOCKS OUT LINES IN THAT STATE.

Austin, Tex., Aug. 25.—The Texas railroad commission has issued an order which is a knockout blow to private lines operating in Texas.

The order requires that all refrigerators for the transportation of fruits by the railroads, and the icing of such shipments, must be done by the roads or the shippers. A maximum schedule of icing charges for shipments between points in Texas is promulgated. These charges range from \$20 a car for a distance of 100 miles up to \$40 a car for a distance of 400 miles.

Under this order the commission the refrigerating cars of Armour & Co. and of the American Refrigerator Transit company, which operate in Texas, will be driven out of the state, except in the transaction of interstate business. The former company operates over the Southern Pacific lines and the American Refrigerator Transit company over the Gould lines.

INCREASE STOCK

Western Pacific Stockholders Take Formal Action.

San Francisco, Aug. 25.—The stockholders of the Western Pacific railroad have formally voted to increase the capital stock from \$50,000,000 to \$75,000,000. W. F. Bartnett, Judge J. F. Vaile of Denver and several local men held the stock proxies of George J. Gould and other easterners.

Representatives of the New York banking firms which recently took up the \$50,000,000 bond issue of the company are present at the meeting. The contracts for grading the roadbed are to be let within a few days.
