**PRISONER BRINGS OUT FOR JUSTICE**

**JOSEPH TILL APPEALS TO PUBLIC OF NORTH DAKOTA.**

Arrested When He Had Been in the United States Only Eight Days and Convicted by Circumstantial Evidence of the Murder of His Cousin—Ten Jurors Sign His Petition.

Grand Forks, N. D., Sept. 4.—Joseph Till, convicted in Pembina county of the murder of his cousin, Adam Miller, and sentenced to life imprisonment, has served ten years, his application for pardon being refused several times. His conviction was entirely on circumstantial evidence. In a recent letter he makes a public appeal for executive clemency.

"I was sent up from Pembina county on July 16, 1895, on a charge of murder, for life. I am an innocent man of this crime, but I am not censorious of the people of Pembina county, as I surely do appreciate the kindness which they have shown me. When several years ago W. J. Kneeshaw, now district judge, made application to Governor Fancher for my pardon, ten of the jurors who convicted me signed the petition. Every one who followed my case believed me an innocent man, and I am absolutely innocent, or I would not write this letter.

"If my case had been given to the jury in its proper light I would have been acquitted. I had been in the United States only eight days when I was arrested for another person's crime, and not being able to understand or speak the English language I never got justice.

"Friends and citizens of Pembina county, I think I should have justice meted out to me. God alone knows how I have suffered this last long ten years. I am able to speak English and write neatly, and I have a good trade, but I cannot use it. I have a dear old mother who has been bedridden ever since my arrest, and I would like to see her and to be with her in this world. I only ask in the name of God, the Father Almighty, who has sent me a good many friends, whom I had never seen, but God saw them in my behalf, as I have been praying for friends and my prayers have been answered. I ask the people of Pembina county to encourage me with a petition to the governor and the board of pardons to pardon me or give me a new trial, for I can bring into court three witnesses to prove my innocence."

**Deserted Ten Days After Marriage.**

John Penture has started an action in the district court to dissolve one of two marriage ceremonies that bound him to either or worse to Miss Mary Seliger.

The couple were doubly married on April 10, 1904, and the husband says that his wife deserted him ten days after the marriage ceremonies.

The marriage was solemnized first by a civil marriage and then in accordance with the tenets of the Hebrew church, at 4 o'clock on the following morning, April 10, 1904.

It is understood that Mrs. Penture is living in some place in the city. J. A. Seeger is looking after the interests of the husband in the action for divorce.

Friends, who had the score-card privilege at the state fair, was arrested at Crookston and will be returned to this city on a charge of obtaining money and false pretenses. Rivers gave a printing firm a check for \$10 in part payment of his bill, drawn on the First National bank of Grand Forks in which he never had any funds. He refuses to return to this state without a requisition.

**Splendid Health Investment.**

The water of Grand Forks, which is served through a sand filter, is regarded as pure as any water that can be found in the country. Secretary Bracken of the Minnesota board of health, took three samples of filtered water, on Feb. 12, March 20 and May 23. His report has just been received by the city health department.

The lowest percentage of purity in the samples was found to be 98.50 per cent, and the highest 99.75, making an average percentage of purity of 99.24. The lowest percentage of purity was found in a sample of water taken just after the filter had been filled with new sand, and at such periods it is noticeable that the plant does not work as well as at other times. Some time after the sand has become settled, new sand is provided about once a year, and the sand beds are cleaned by scraping several times a year. The filter cost Grand Forks \$40,000 and was installed just after a typhoid epidemic. It is the best investment the city ever made.

In July there were 367 births in North Dakota, and 108 deaths. Sixty of the deaths were from typhoid, one from typhoid fever, six from diphtheria, two from scarlet fever and seven from other infectious diseases.

**JOLT FOR PARLIAMAN**

Prominent South Dakotan Said to Have Violated Game Law.

ABERDEEN, S. D.—Game Warden Linnet discovered two prairie chickens and two ducks at the Milwaukee station addressed to the wife of R. W. Parliaman of Sioux Falls. Parliaman has been shooting in Iowa county near Frederick. The South Dakota game law provides that prairie chickens may be shipped from one town to another, under the letter of a game warden, when accompanied by their owner and left in plain view. Mr. Parliaman, it is alleged, neglected to comply with either of these provisions, and the game warden will bring him to Aberdeen for examination.

A leak in the artesian well at the mill at Ashton is causing the residents of that town some uneasiness. The leak was first discovered through a spring which gushed forth at a distance of 500 feet from the well. The water is clear and well heavily permeated with natural gas, and it is supposed the leak is due to this cause. As the well has a great pressure, and some uneasiness is felt the leak become more extensive and causes serious damage.

At Anna and Irving six miles northwest of Haven, in Walworth county, was watching a threshing machine in operation, the grain elevator belt came off, the loose end striking where she stood, while the other got into the miller. Stopping to pick it up, her arm became entangled and before she could be freed she was struck by the miller. She died instantly of a fracture of the wrist and elbow joint. An amputation was performed at the elbow joint. The company owning the miller is the J. H. Jangner, in Walworth county. At the time it was noticed that the water was strongly impregnated with gas, and the manager was instructed to utilize it until recently. Last week the manager of the ranch piped the gas into his house and it furnishes enough light and heat to run the building.

**ALL CATTLE MUST BE DIPPED**

Federal Authorities Overrule Decision of the Lower Court.

HURON, S. D.—As a result of proceedings in circuit court here by cattlemen to resist the enforcement of the order of the state board requiring all cattle to be dipped, whether infected with "scabies" or not, Inspector Ramsey, representing the department at Washington, is making a personal investigation of conditions and will submit his findings to the department of animal industry at Washington.

Mr. Ramsey says that the bureau has carefully considered the question of placing the entire state of Dakota under quarantine, thus requiring all cattle to be dipped, but as the state board has already pronounced an order placing the infected district under quarantine, he would stand by the action of the board and allow no cattle to be shipped out of the state without being dipped.

There are eighteen counties in the quarantined district of this state. In the proceedings in circuit court here before Judge Whiting, the opinion of the court was that only infected cattle should be dipped, but this later proceeding of the part of the federal authorities sets aside the findings of the lower court.

**EXPRESS COMPANY RESISTS**

Believes Railway Commissioners Are Powerless to Discipline It.

SIoux FALLS, S. D.—The United States Express company has made unexpected news in the case recently decided against it by the South Dakota board of railroad commissioners, which issued an order requiring it to receive shipments of money at any time in business hours instead of immediately prior to the departure of trains, as has been the custom.

The express company has instituted an action in the United States court to determine whether or not the board of railroad commissioners has jurisdiction in cases in which express companies are involved.

The court authorities have arrested a man giving his name as Thomas Murphy, but whose true name, it is believed, is Pat Glaster. He is charged with being implicated in robbing Arthur D. Porter.
