

COURTS RACING IN DIVORCE CASE

Husband Sues in Texas and His Wife in West Virginia—Fortune Is at Stake.

Morgantown, W. Va., Sept. 15.—The speed of Texas and West Virginia courts is being tested in a race for divorce now going on between Ida A. Lawson of this place, and Lewis C. Lawson, an attorney of El Paso, Texas, formerly a practitioner of Clarksville, this state.

Mrs. Lawson and her husband separated a few years ago, Mrs. Lawson coming to this place to educate her children and Mr. Lawson leaving Clarksville and going to El Paso. There he began divorce proceedings and obtained a decree when Mrs. Lawson learned of it she sent attorneys to Texas and had the decree set aside on the ground that the attorney who appeared for her had no authority to do so.

She then brought suit for divorce in the court here and her husband began a new suit in Texas. Then began a desperate race for prize being a possible alimony allowance in this state, for Mr. Lawson is wealthy and has valuable holdings here. The Texas court will convene on the same day that the suit here will mature.

RAILROADS WORK FOR SOO ANNUAL

NO CHANGES LIKELY TO BE MADE IN BOARD OF DIRECTORS AS IT STANDS.

Any changes that may be made at the annual meeting of the Soo line stockholders or directors Tuesday in directory or official will not be according to state. No known reason exists why the directors already in office are not satisfactory to the Canadian Pacific road, which owns 51 per cent of the stock, or to other large holders.

MILWAUKEE BUYS

Road Will Put In New Terminals at Sioux City. Special to the Journal. Sioux City, Iowa, Sept. 15.—J. Q. Adams of Milwaukee, secretary of the Milwaukee road, has begun the purchase of several blocks of land at the intersection of the railroad with Fourth street, the principal street of the city, for the construction of a new depot over \$150,000 for ground alone. No estimate is yet given out of the cost of the buildings that will be put up. The improvement was ordered because of the expectation of increased travel thru this point as a result of the extension of the company's lines west of the Missouri river.

NOT AN OBSTRUCTION

Injunction Against Soo Bridge Does Not Hold. Application by the East Grand Forks Transportation company for an injunction restraining the Soo line from maintaining a bridge on the Thief River Falls line across the Red river and derailing its railway was denied yesterday by Judge Amidon of the federal court. The Soo showed that its bridge does not now obstruct navigation by the plaintiff's boats. The judge stated that if in the future appliances provided by the railroad company were inadequate, the petition might be renewed.

RECEPTION ON TRAIN

North Dakota Governor Rides with Passenger Agents. Governor Saries of North Dakota received the traveling passenger agents on their way to the coast Sunday afternoon on board the train. While the Great Northern special was flying across the country, in charge of General Passenger Agent C. E. Stone, the guests of the commonwealth were being introduced to the governor. At Helena he met Governor Toole of Montana.

NORTH-WESTERN BUYS

Purchases the Right of Way of New Railroad. Special to the Journal. Rapid City, S. D., Sept. 15.—At a meeting of directors of the Rapid City, Missouri River & St. Paul railroad, held here Wednesday evening, the North-Western railroad purchasing the grade and right-of-way of the company. Two gangs are re-surveying the line to Cheyenne river, and a grading outfit is on the ground ready to begin the work. The North-Western paid \$350,000, and agreed in the contract to operate the line at once. Rapid City will be a junction point on the line.

Chicago Will Not Play

The baseball game between the Chicago and St. Paul Transportation leagues has been called off, on account of the death of the father of the secretary of the Transcontinental association. Teams from the St. Paul league will play, however.

Bridge Work Is Let

Bridge work on the Duluth, St. Cloud, Glenoc and Mankato road has been begun by a Minneapolis contractor. Trains are expected to run as Mankato from Albert Lea this season. Much work will have to go over the winter because of scarcity of men and teams.
