## OBSTACLES BLOCK WAY TO RELIEF OF ALBERS

New York Sun Special Service. Washington, Sept. 16.—Great difficulty is being experienced by the department of state in starting an expedition for the relief of William C. Albers, the American citizen imprisoned at Ocot, Nicaragua, seventy miles inland, and about whose case the department has been unable to get any satisfactory information.

President Roosevelt decided to send the gunboat Princeton with Minister Merry aboard to the nearest port and have the minister go overland. When it was learned that the trip over the mountains to Ocot was an exceedingly hazardous one, especially for a man of the age of Minister Merry, it was decided that Consul Lee at Panama should go. Then the government was reminded that the Central and South American countries had quarantined against Panama because of plague. Some other course must be taken by the government.

## DEPOSED AUDITOR SCOURGES GOV.

Sherrick, Removed by Hanley, Declares He Will "Show Up" the Indiana Executive.

New York Sun Special Service. Indianapolis, Ind., Sept. 16.—Few republicans are indorsing the removal of Auditor Sherrick. Governor Hanley had promised to wait until Sept. 15 for a settlement and Sherrick's friends were working with this date in view. It cannot be understood why Governor Hanley acted twenty-four hours in advance of the time he had fixed. It is intimated that Hanley knew that Sherrick's friends had almost succeeded in their efforts and that the full shortage was almost raised.

Sherrick's bond was fixed at \$15,000 yesterday and accepted by the state. It represented millions. Sherrick is very bitter at the action of the governor and said:

"I had every cent provided for to be paid as promised. All of the office officers who handle state funds were given till Oct. 4 to make their reports. I of all of them was singled out and told that I must have mine in by Sept. 15."

"Mr. Hanley will be shown his mistake, tho. I propose to show the public that I am not a black criminal, and also propose to show that all of this reform movement of the governor is not for the love of law and order, but primarily for his own gain. I will make Hanley eat his words or force him to put me in a position where the facts will be made known."

"I lent Governor Hanley \$750 with which to make his race for governor and it was state funds. He was quite willing to accept an accommodation from me then, and he must have known at the time that it was state money he was using. It is not the only favor I have extended him at his solicitation in times past. But Governor Hanley has demonstrated that he is one of those men who can cheerfully sacrifice the men who have benefited him when all he can possibly gain from such a sacrifice is a little newspaper notoriety."

This statement was made by David E. Sherrick in the presence of County Auditor Cyrus J. Clark, W. S. Wickard, Floyd Woods and several other friends who had gathered at Mr. Sherrick's home for the purpose of extending him such aid as might be possible. Several prominent republicans today openly asserted that J. Frank Hanley, then in the race for the state executive office, soon after the state republican convention of 1904, went to Sherrick with a request for money to pay his campaign expenses and named the amount, which Mr. Sherrick without hesitation gave him, without the "scratch of a pen" in acknowledgement. In course of time, it is said, it was paid back. The payments were made in installments.

## ARONS' ARREST PLEASES HUDSON

Citizens Gratiated that Alleged Bigamist Is at the End of His Rope.

Special to The Journal. Hudson, Wis., Sept. 15.—Great interest was awakened in Hudson by the arrest of Dr. W. C. Arons, the "bonesetter," and satisfaction is expressed over the fact that he has at last reached the end of his notorious career. Many are indignant because he is still spoken of in the press as a resident of Hudson, it being a year since he removed from here.

His career in this city was for a time successful. His private secretary, who left him because of a quarrel, asserted that the doctor cleared one year no less than \$20,000. It is not known how many in every patient that came, promising sure recovery. He was sued several times for malpractice by patients. Hudson's citizens were not surprised to learn of his arrest, not because they generally believed that if all the facts in his eventful career could be brought to light several other wives to his credit would be found.

He demonstrated his power to attract women while here—especially those who possessed some means, and many of his patients were fascinated by him.

James A. Andrews of Hudson, visited the "bonesetter" in Colorado Springs a few days ago. He then refused to acknowledge himself a bigamist, insisting that Mrs. Edna Kemper is not his wife; that he had lived with her, but had never married her. She was persecuting him, he said, because he had left her.

Dr. Arons came to Hudson from Superior. He called his hospital here "Rose Villa." It is not known that he ever took a course in a medical college.

## FIREMAN WOULD NOT WORK

Caused a Mutiny "All by His Lonesome" on Lake Steamer.

## TOWED FOR 3 HOURS BY GIANT MASKALONGE

Muskegon, Mich., Sept. 16.—Harvey Patterson, a Chicago insurance adjuster, went fishing last night, and, altho fishing for speckled bass, suddenly found a gigantic fish tugging at his slender line. Caught by surprise, Patterson was yanked from the boat, but grasped the gunwale as he plunged into the lake. The fish towed the boat up and down the six-mile lake for three hours, and Patterson was in grave danger of drowning when Coroner James Balbirnie arrived in his launch and rescued him. The fish weighed forty pounds and was fifty-two inches long, being the biggest maskalonge ever caught in these waters.
