CHANGE IN TAXPAYING

Stearns County Methods Will Have to Be Revised. ST. CLOUD, MINN.—Stearns county must change its method of taxpaying, is the decision of Deputy Public Examiner M. P. Kane of St. Paul. For several years it has been customary for the county treasurer to send just prior to taxpaying time, duplicate tax bills to the various banking institutions in the county. This method was employed for the convenience of the taxpayers. The bank officials gave the taxpayers county treasurer's receipts, showing that they had liquidated their debts to the county. The deputy public examiner holds that the county treasurer is the only person authorized to sign tax receipts. In the future taxpayers may pay their money to their local bankers and take their personal receipts. The bankers may remit to the county treasurer, who will make out the receipts and send them direct to the taxpayers. This system already prevails in Michigan and many other states.

MILLING COMPANY CHANGES

Mankato Company Elects New Officers—City Sued. MANKATO, MINN.—Changes in the organization of the Hubbard Milling company and of the Hubbard & Palmer Co. have been caused by the death of D. Hubbard, who was president of both concerns. His son, D. Hubbard, Jr., has been elected president of both. George M. Palmer has been elected secretary and treasurer of the Hubbard & Palmer Co., to take the place left vacant by the promotion of Jay Hubbard. Maria Foster has made a demand upon the city for \$5,000 damage for injuries to her property falling over an embankment where the Omaha road makes a cut in the north part of the city. She says that the embankment is not guarded. The city council has contracted with the Windmillier company to put down another embankment well to increase the supply of water.

HOTEL MAN FOUND

Crookston Man, Charged with Theft, Captured in Montana. CROOKSTON, MINN.—W. J. Beers, formerly proprietor of the Broadway hotel in this city and a fugitive from justice charged with taking \$150 intrusted to him by guests at his hotel, was brought back to this city last evening by Sheriff Gordon from Bozeman, Mont., where he was found after a long and wild life. He was arraigned before Judge McLain Beers waived examination and was remanded to jail to await the action of the grand jury.

FAIR A BIG SUCCESS

Nicollet County Agricultural Association Is Prosperous. ST. PETER, MINN.—One of the greatest successes in its history was scored last week by the Nicollet county fair, which closed Saturday. In the thirty-five years of its existence, during fifteen of which Governor John A. Johnson was its secretary, the Nicollet County Agricultural society has never had a more successful and profitable fair, and has paid its purses, premiums and other obligations dollar for dollar. This year the perfect weather ran the attendance for the two days over 8,000. Saturday's crowd reached a total of fully 2,000 and they witnessed a splendid race. In the free-for-all Billy Rogers won. Dell E. was second and Star Boy third. The special race resulted: Charles Dewey, first; Polly H., second, and Jimmy McFayre third. On the diamond Montgomery defeated Le Sueur Center 7 to 4.

SACRIFICES LOCKS FOR EDUCATION IOWA GIRL MAKES DESPERATE ATTEMPT TO GET TO SCHOOL

Shaves Off Hair, Ties Herself to Tree, and Tells Story of Indignities by Roughs in Order to Awaken Sympathies of Parents—Posse Hunts Roughs In Vain.

Marshalltown, Iowa, Sept. 18.—Dissatisfied with her lot as a domestic in the family of a farmer near Le Grand, Cora Stantfeld, a pretty girl of 15 years, adopted unusual methods to induce her parents to send her to school. She procured a razor and shaved off her golden locks, cutting and hacking at them until she presented a frightful appearance. She then took a rope and tied herself to a tree near the house of her employer, John Rubenbauer, where she succeeded, after waiting several hours, in attracting the attention of persons passing. The girl told a story of having been assaulted by two strange men, who cut off her hair and tied her to a tree, stuffing her apron in her mouth to prevent her crying out. She said that the men, after cutting off her hair, disappeared in the direction of Le Grand. The sheriff and his deputies were notified here and organized a posse and went in search of the men. The posse searched in vain, and at last the sheriff began to suspect that the girl had not been telling the truth. After an hour and a half spent in questioning her, she broke down and admitted she had tied herself to the tree and cut off her own locks, stating that her reason for so doing was that she hoped to get her parents to take her from the work she was doing and send her to school.
