CITY NEWS

BIG CONVENTIONS HERE IN OCTOBER

TWO NATIONAL AND TWO STATE GATHERINGS TO BE HELD.

Minnesota Women's Foreign Missionary Society, National Spiritualists' Association, State Federation of Women's Clubs and Universalist National Conventions Are Coming.

Minneapolis is to entertain several important conventions during the month of October. Two are national conventions that will attract large numbers of delegates and friends and two are state conventions of more than ordinary interest.

The Women's Foreign Missionary society of the state will meet in the city Oct. 11 and 12. The place of meeting is not decided on as yet.

The National Spiritualists' association will meet Oct. 17 for the thirteenth annual convention. The sessions will be held in the First Unitarian church, and will last four days.

The State Federation of Women's clubs will meet in the First Baptist church for a three-day session beginning Oct. 18. Over 400 delegates and visitors, including some of the national officers of the organization are expected.

The Universalist National convention will begin a six-day session in the Church of the Redeemer Oct. 19. Rev. F. A. Bisbee of Boston has been in the city making arrangements for the transportation and accommodation of eastern delegates, a large number of whom are expected.

The Commercial club, thru its public affairs committee, has been influential in securing these meetings and has done much of the work of arranging for handling and caring for the crowds that will visit the city.

The G. A. R. convention of next summer will be well handled if ample time in preparation will count. The committees in charge are holding regular meetings to map out and keep in order the work.

RAINS DELAY THRESHING

Weather and crop conditions for Minnesota during the week ending Sept. 18 are summarized by Charles A. Hoyle, acting section director in the government service, in the following bulletin:

The afternoon of the 11th was fairly warm, with maximum temperatures as high as 83 degrees reported. Temperatures during the afternoon of the 12th with very light rain reported from low-lying places, but no damage resulted.

The temperature of the remaining days of the week was generally mild. Light scattered showers occurred on nearly every day of the week in some portions of the state.

The rains were heavy in the northern districts on the night of the 12th or early morning of the 14th, which delayed threshing in that section for several days.

The frequent rains have delayed threshing in all sections. Shock threshing is nearing completion, and threshing from the stack is progressing nicely, except in the northern counties. Efforts were still being made to cut the grain in the flooded districts of the northern counties until the heavy rain of the 14th, when cutting was generally abandoned.

Corn has ripened rapidly during the week, and much of it is cut; all will be out of danger of frost in another week. A good crop is generally reported.

Potatoes are being gathered in southern counties, but they are not a good crop, except in the southwestern counties. Potatoes are generally reported.

Some blight has occurred in east central counties. Plowing is in progress, but some fields are still too dry to plow. Rye seeding is in progress. Pastures are still good in northern counties. Apples are being gathered, and a fair to good crop is reported.

SAYS WOMEN SHOULD WEAR SMALLER HATS

Dr. Martha Ripley told the women of the Political Equality club that if they wished to engage in a reform which would be of immediate and practical benefit, they should start a crusade against the big hats now affected by well-dressed women.

She declared that an array of them in a church or lecture hall often completely obscures a view of the speaker. The club took no action on the suggestion, but received reports on the national convention at Portland from Mrs. Maud Stockwell, Dr. Cora Smith Eaton and Mrs. Lizzie McCleary.

Little; finance, Mrs. Lizzie McCleary; entertainment, Mrs. F. M. Stacy.

BEGIN NEXT SPRING Short Line Extension to Be Built by July 1. Special to The Journal. Iowa Falls, Iowa, Sept. 20.—E. S. Ellsworth, president of the Des Moines Short Line, has returned with Mrs. Ellsworth from Europe. He says that most of the right-of-way for the extension has been secured as far as Mason City.

The Iowa Construction company, which has the contract for building the line will commence work in the spring, and work will be done all along the line, as the contract calls for its completion by July 1. This is a change in the plans of the company, as it was thought the road would be built as far as Hampton this year, and the rest next spring.

The survey decided on by the company runs in almost a direct line from this city to Hampton, and from that point parallel to the Iowa Central at a distance of from one-half to one mile, thus missing Rockwell, by striking Chapin and Sheffield, and several other prosperous towns along the Iowa Central between Mason City and Hampton.
