## BUMPER CROPS IN THE JAMES VALLEY

### WHEAT ABOUT GERBER, N. D., AVERAGES FROM 23 TO 25 BU.

Farmers Around Courtenay, N. D., More Concerned Over the Price Just Now Than Yields — Pessimistic Reports from Fertile and Frazee, Minn.

Specials to The Journal. Courtenay, N. D., Sept. 20.—Many threshing machines are running in this vicinity. The yields in most instances are very satisfactory and the farmers are worrying more about the price than anything else. The yield will average from fifteen to twenty bushels to the acre, and much of it is grading No. 1 northern.

Gerber, N. D., Sept. 20.—Some bumper crops are being threshed in this corner of the county. Oats average forty to fifty bushels to the acre and wheat about twenty-three to twenty-five. Teams are reported scarce west of New Home. Some have offered \$5 a day for a man and a team, \$4.50 being "going" wages in this part of the county.

### THRESHING DISAPPOINTS

#### Much Grain Also Around Fertile Will Not Be Cut.

Specials to The Journal. Fertile, Minn., Sept. 20.—Harvesting and stacking are nearly finished and threshing commenced two weeks ago, but rains have interfered with the work. Thousands of acres of wheat and other grain will be left uncut this fall. But the way wheat turns out after threshing is the greatest disappointment to the farmer. Fields estimated on July 20 to go twenty-eight or thirty bushels an acre, yield but nine to fourteen bushels, and fields which, by traveling grain experts, were estimated at twenty bushels, go from four to twelve bushels an acre.

The average for North Dakota and northern Minnesota will not be higher than last year, but the quality will be better. Oats, barley, rye and flax are all above an average crop, both in quality and quantity.

Frazee, Minn., Sept. 20.—The heavy rains have stopped all threshing from the shock, and the farmers who have not stacked are troubled. Rain has already made the wheat lower in grade. A rot or blight on the potato crop and not one-half of it can be gathered. Hundreds of bushels are wasted and the hogs will not even eat some of the blighted crop. Potatoes are already a fair price, and they will be much higher when the true condition of the crop is known.

### RETURNS OF A MONTH

#### Wheat Near Westington, S. D., Runs from 15 to 25 Bu. to the Acre.

Specials to The Journal. Miller, S. D., Sept. 20.—I. J. Fisher and son, near Westington, have run their steam thrasher a month. The fifteen bushels and as high as twenty-five to the acre. The proprietors of the machine have 400 acres of wheat of their own to thresh that they estimate at twenty bushels to the acre.

The cry for help goes out from the farmer, but none is forthcoming at any wages. With the labor-saving devices to gather the crops comparatively few men are needed, but enough cannot be found.

### Corn Ahead of Frost.

Specials to The Journal. Aberdeen, S. D., Sept. 20.—The corn crop in northern Brown county is believed to be out of the way of frost. The crop is a good one, while the acreage is larger than ever before.

### Threshing Held Back.

Specials to The Journal. Milbank, S. D., Sept. 20.—Continued rains have retarded threshing and caused some damage. Late corn and flax have been cut. The corn crop will be the best raised in Grant county for several years. The wheat yield averages from ten to eleven bushels an acre.

## YELLOW FEVER BEATEN IN THE CRESCENT CITY

New Orleans, Sept. 20.—Investigation with a view to the discovery of the germ of yellow fever continues at the emergency hospital. Within the past week eight autopsies have been held at the hospital in connection with the investigations, the results of which are to be published when the fever is over.

Generally, the fever situation is regarded as encouraging. In the country there are a large number of cases, but now that experienced yellow fever fighters are in charge at each point of infection, the fatalities are few.

The Woman's league, which has had much to do with the educational campaign during the existence of the fever, desires an opportunity especially to thank President Roosevelt for his services to the city in its great crisis. Thru Mrs. Behan, its chairman, it will ask for half an hour of the president's time in this city and have Dr. Kohnke give his illustrated lecture with information as to how the campaign has been conducted.
