## FATALLY WHIPPED BY THE "BETTER PEOPLE"

 Huntington, W. Va., Sept. 25.—A mob, said to have been composed of the better class of people at Williamson, the county seat of Mingo county, W. Va., last night broke in the jail door and, forcing open a cell, took Moses Lovern, a negro, across Tug river into Kentucky, where he was tied to a tree and fatally whipped. The man was then taken back to the jail and thrown inside the prison. Arrests of the members of the mob are expected. Lovern's alleged crime consists of having struck James Butcher, a prominent business man, with a club yesterday, inflicting a dangerous wound.

## PREACHER CALLS M'CALL A THIEF

New York Clergyman Scourges Insurance President in Sermon from Pulpit.

New York, Sept. 25.—His (John A. McCall's) confession has branded him as a thief.  
 Rev. Dr. A. Lincoln Moore said this yesterday in a pulpit of the Russian Baptist church, in a sermon on the text, "Thou Shalt Not Steal."  
 Dr. Moore, on Saturday, mailed an open letter to President McCall of the New York Insurance company, demanding the latter's resignation. The pastor is a policy-holder, and much of what he said in the letter he discussed with his congregation.  
 "The revelations of the methods of persons in authority in some of our life insurance corporations," said the preacher, "may well astound the community. When the president of the New York Life Insurance company testifies that he took vast sums of the policy-holders' money without other authority than his own, and gave it for political and partisan ends, that confession branded him as a thief."  
 "This man ought to be compelled to restore what he has stolen or else be ought to be prosecuted and incarcerated."

## ITALIANS TO BE LEFT TO PERISH OF FEVER

New Orleans, Sept. 25.—Unless the Italians living on Point Celeste plantation, thirty miles below Plaquemine parish, allow the state health board's physicians to fumigate their houses and furnish free medical attention, the health authorities will abandon operations there and force the fever to run its course among the refractory foreigners.  
 The Italians operate the plantations for themselves with several negro laborers, and as they have threatened to kill the first medical inspector who goes to their place, the board has been unable to check infection.  
 The board proposes placing quarantine guards around Point Celeste plantation to prevent all persons from going and coming from that place. In this way it is hoped to starve the Italians into submission, as thirty of the forty Italians have taken yellow fever and six have died, leaving ten for the disease to prey upon.

## EAGLE VANQUISHED BY TWO BOYS AND A DOG

 Newark, N. J., Sept. 25.—Made desperate by hunger, a bald eagle measuring 5 feet 6 inches from tip to toe swooped down and attempted to carry off the Bitters brothers' pet dog, near Vailsburg, today, and was killed by them.  
 The brothers, Edwin and Felix, 12 and 13 years old, were on their way home and were crossing Kilburn's stock farm. They heard the whirring of wings, and looking around they saw the eagle attack their pet terrier.  
 The eagle miscalculated the activity of the dog, which yelped and jumped to one side. Instantly, leaving another dash at the dog, its talons extended, but missed and struck the ground. Edwin, the younger of the two, seized the big bird by the neck and hung on. The eagle, however, was not deterred, and the boy's shirtwaist and trousers, badly lacerating his flesh with its powerful claws.  
 Felix, who was carrying a baseball bat, struck the eagle on the head, stunning it. Before it could recover the boys killed it with blows from the baseball bat and a stone. The dog also joined in at the finish.

## 1,000 FARMERS BANDED AGAINST AUTOMOBILES

 Mexico, Mo., Sept. 25.—A thousand farmers held a mass meeting here yesterday, formed a permanent anti-automobile association, and adopted resolutions praying for laws regarding the driving of motor cars, which will be presented to the legislature. The resolutions cover thirty-six pages of foolscap and recommend, among various other things, that the makers of automobiles be compelled to give bond for any damage which may result from their carelessness, and many impassioned addresses were made.

## SINGAPORE TO BECOME BRITISH NAVAL BASE

London, Sept. 25.—The fact that the British government proposes to establish a vast naval base at Singapore, which was announced by the Sunday Observer with the suggestion that this was the first tangible result of the new Anglo-Japanese alliance and the conclusion of the Russo-Japanese war, afforded the newspapers an opportunity for discussing a subject which was passed without much notice at the time the decision of the government to use Singapore as a base was first announced, some time ago, when Admiral Fisher outlined the naval organization plan.  
 The papers now only point out the enormous strategic value of Singapore as guarding the gateway to the Pacific and when open to Japan's war vessels as giving Great Britain and Japan the whip hand over the other European countries.

## SUNDAY DRUNKS IN KANSAS CITY INCREASE

 Kansas City, Sept. 25.—Including the "safekeeper" with whose being drunk, or "drunk and disturbing the peace," the police records show an increase of drunkenness of 17 per cent since the Sunday-closing law went into effect under Governor Folk's "lid" order twenty-three weeks ago, or 153 arrests, twenty-three Sundays before, and 188 after the order was issued.  
 Chief Hayes has been quoted as saying the police were more vigilant for "drunks" in their eagerness to show the Sunday-closing order was effective and made more arrests than they did formerly. Other officers scout the idea, as each arrest they make necessitates their appearing in a police court during their "off" time to prosecute.
