\$1,233,655 FOR SCHOOL EXPENSE

WITHIN \$50,000 OF AMOUNT ASKED
IN ESTIMATE.

Board Needs Every Cent for School Maintenance and Is Planning to Spend \$250,000 on New Buildings Next Year, Provided School Bonds Amounting to \$200,000 Are Legalized.

Assuming that the assessed valuation of Minneapolis for taxation purposes will be about \$138,500,000, which was the latest figure available from the state board of equalization, the board of education will have to dispose of the school year of 1905-06 the sum of \$1,233,655. This is within \$50,000 of the amount asked by the school directors in their estimate.

The revenues of the board of education, aside from direct taxation, are estimated as follows: State apportionment, \$140,000; state high-school apportionment, \$5,000; taxes of 1904 and previous years, \$300,000. These items are likely to be increased, as the estimates are based on the minimum. Then there is a cash balance of \$100,000 available, and with 70 per cent of the 7.5 mill levy allowed by the board of tax levy, which will yield \$727,125, the board will have the \$1,233,655 previously referred to. The remaining 30 per cent of the taxes will be applied to the expenses for the school year 1906-07.

The largest item of expense is for the salaries of teachers, which will take \$815,000. The janitors will draw \$71,000. Fuel will require \$42,000, \$38,000, textbooks \$35,000, and printing and supplies \$10,000. There are also such items as the salaries for the clerks and other help in the supply department, insurance, rent of laboratories, apparatus for the high-school laboratories, furnishings of new buildings, pure water and interest on loans and bonds.

The board is planning to spend about \$250,000 on new buildings next year, provided the school bonds amounting to \$200,000, are legalized. An estimate of the needs of the schools shows that the board could expend about \$320,000 to good advantage. New buildings are needed in Linden Hills, in the Glenair addition in Southeast Minneapolis, Bryn Mawr, in the section of the city between the Clinton and Bryant schools, and in the district between the Adams, Jackson, Peabody and Clay schools. An addition is needed for the Corcoran school, and for the school between Lowell, Rosedale and Sidney Pratt schools. In all these sections of the city there is serious congestion and imperative demand for relief. The additions and new buildings will cost \$20,000 to \$45,000 in each case. The new Lincoln and Hiawatha schools and the additions to the Horace Mann and Holland schools will relieve the conditions somewhat, but with an increase of more than 1,200 annually in the school population the relief will be only temporary, and then not complete.

According to State Superintendent Olson, 75,709 books costing \$50,482.98, were added to public school libraries during the last school year. Of this cost the state paid \$23,146.88, and the school districts \$27,336.08. The state gives aid to the amount of one-half when the books are bought under contracts made by the state library commission. There are 2,102 school libraries in the state.

Hennepin county added 2,502 books last year, costing \$2,382.95, of which the state paid \$1,140.40.

MORE EXCELSIOR CARS

Half-Hour Schedule Will Obtain Tomorrow and Sunday.

The street railway company plans to take care of all the business that is expected on the Minnetonka line tomorrow and Sunday. The pleasant weather has resulted in unusual travel and Excelsior for the past week has been as lively as during the midsummer rush. To accommodate the heavy business expected on Saturday and Sunday a half-hour schedule will be adopted in place of the hourly schedule used heretofore.

Altho the Excelsior plant is not yet in operation the company has made arrangements to secure additional power at the Excelsior end of the line from the stations at Hopkins and Elevator street. Instead of one car each way every hour, sections of two or three cars a few minutes apart will be started every half hour. The lake boats are still in commission and make regular connections with the cars at the Excelsior docks.

SCHOOL TOO CROWDED

Minnetonka Beach Children Unable to Find Accommodations.

Citizens of Minnetonka Beach have made complaint of inadequate school facilities to State Superintendent J. W. Olson. They say that nearly thirty children are deprived of school work because of the lack of room for them in the school building. Mr. Olson has replied that he cannot aid them, and their only recourse is to the trustees of the district.

AUTO COPPERS SEE MAYOR

PRINCIPAL VIOLATIONS OF ORDINANCE ARE DISCUSSED AND CORRECTIVE MEASURES PLANNED.

Three special automobile "coppers," Colonel Frank M. Joyce, A. E. Paegel and Dr. A. P. Walrath, waited on Mayor D. P. Jones today for a council of war on the enforcement of the state law and the city ordinance regulating the operation of automobiles on public highways. It was reported that the ten volunteer policemen from the Automobile club had been doing much valuable work, altho no arrests had yet been made. Outside of exceeding the speed limit, the most general offenses are non-compliance with the clause requiring that the license numbers shall be firmly fixed to the body of the car, and running without any number at all. The dangling card containing the number is a direct violation of the law and is held by the authorities to be a willful evasion, as the board is so fastened that it can be slipped off in a moment if the chauffeur desires to conceal the number. The speeding of automobiles is an-

other general offense. It is admitted that there is room for improvement and the Automobile club is as anxious to discipline the unruly drivers as anyone. Mayor Jones approved of the efforts of the club to secure the recognition of the laws without creating any illwill, but intimated that the administration would be compelled to take a hand if the law was not observed to the letter.
