NATURALIST AND HUNTER PASS THRU CITY AFTER TRIP.

William T. Hornaday, Curator of New York Zoological Gardens at Bronx Park, and John M. Phillips of Pittsburgh had Rare Sport in a Secret Preserve in the Canadian Rockies.

William T. Hornaday, curator of the New York Zoological park in Bronx park, New York city, and John M. Phillips of Pittsburgh passed thru Minneapolis on the Great Northern flyer last night. They were returning from a month's hunting trip in the unexplored regions of British Columbia.

Mr. Phillips is a naturalist of international repute and his work, "The Natural History of America," is a standard authority. He is also an extensive contributor to the magazines, the current number of Scribner's containing an article from his pen on "Horns and Horns."

Mr. Phillips, Mr. Hornaday and their guides entered the hunting region Sept. 3 and pitched camp in a couple of game regions in the Canadian Rockies.

TO USE UNION MEN

Striking Job Printers Consider Starting a Co-operative Shop.

If the job printers' strike continues much longer an attempt will be made to start a co-operative union shop to provide employment for the men who are out of work.

It was explained by typographical officers today that the printer in question is said to have been paroled thru the influence of the employers and is union man.

Any union printer forfeits his card if sent to prison, said Secretary O'Connor. The delegation of union men calling on Governor Johnson asked that he be allowed to work on his own sort that he might not be compelled to work as a strikebreaker and not because he was a union man.

MEN WHO ROBBED TRAIN WERE WISE

THEY DID A CLEAN, WORKMAN-LIKE JOB, SAYS TRAVELER.

Passenger on Great Northern Flyer Held Up Near Seattle, Which Reached Minneapolis Last Night, Says Bandits Kept Out of Sleepers, Not Caring to Risk Death.

The Great Northern Flyer, which was held up near Seattle, Wash., Monday night, pulled into the Minneapolis union station last night six hours late. The wrecked express car had been replaced and the only signs of the exciting adventure the train had been thru were a few grooves along the sides of the buffet car, made by the bullets of the bandits.

The Pullmans were at the rear of the train and many of the passengers did not know that the train had been held up until the next morning, when they were much chagrined to find they had been thru a real wild western experience without getting any thrills out of it.

The boys who made a feeble attempt to levy contributions in the day coaches passed thru the sleepers without making a disturbance. One of the passengers said that the reason for this was that the berths were largely made up and the boys bandits were unwilling to well anyone get the drop on them.

Earnest B. Hussey, a civil engineer of Seattle, said: "We knew what was going on outside, for we could plainly hear the explosions in the express car, and the robbers kept up a constant fusillade along both sides of the train with rifles. I don't think anyone in our car was frightened, for we knew that we were safe so long as we remained inside and the express ourselves to the fire which raked both sides of the train."
