"CONFISCATION" IS THE TERM IN WISCONSIN. Madison, Wis., Oct. 11.—Insurance Commissioner Zeno M. Host, in his annual report on life and casualty companies, the advance sheets of which were made public today, declares that the thirty-seven old-line life insurance companies doing business in Wisconsin last year "confiscated \$14,000,000 which belonged to and should have been returned to the policy holders." "The reserve released on surrendered and lapsed policies during 1904 amounted to \$51,474,449.85," says the report, "while the actual sum paid by these companies to policyholders who lapsed and surrendered their policies was only \$37,752,732.59. In other words, the thirty-seven companies confiscated \$14,000,000." The report also says that the amount expended by these companies in getting business was \$7,000,000 more than the amount allowed for that purpose. The Greek government will commemorate the Olympic games of next year by a series of special postage stamps.

MARSHALL LOSES AGAIN. Nuremberg, Germany, Oct. 11.—Another victory for Dr. Tarrasch of this city resulted yesterday from the sixteenth game of his chess match with F. J. Marshall of Brooklyn at the Nuremberg chess club. The contest lasted thirty-five moves. Marshall had the black pieces and for the first time resorted to the Sicilian defense. It proved inadequate against the scientific attack the German champion was able to establish. Score: Tarrasch 7, Marshall 1, drawn 8.

GARDNER MAY BATTLE. San Francisco, Oct. 11.—Billy Nolan, manager of "Battling" Nelson, has announced that he will agree to match the "battler" against Jimmy Gardner of Lowell for twenty-five rounds at 135 pounds, but stipulates that Gardner must weigh in at the ringside. The fight cannot take place before March, as Nelson's theatrical engagements will not permit him to enter the ring again before that time.
