SCORES SHUNNED SUPPOSED BOMBS

ATTEMPT TO "WRECK CHURCH OF REDEEMER" IS FOILED.

Discarded Dry Batteries Were Mistaken for Dynamite Bombs by an Imaginative Pedestrian Who, Out of Pure Benevolence, Guarded the Spot and Made Wayfarers Take a Detour.

Pedestrians who walked to work this morning along Second avenue or Eighth street were put to some discomfort by an excited man who stood in front of the Church of the Redeemer and warned them not to come near the corner, as the gutter was "filled with dynamite bombs."

He knew the anarchist's tools when he saw them, he said, and he was confident that someone had planned to blow up the church and had been frightened away, leaving the bombs in the gutter. The police were skeptical, but sent Sergeant Tom Russell and a patrolman to investigate.

In the gutter that runs along Second avenue they found half buried under a pile of autumn leaves, two dry-cell electric batteries that had been thrown away by some electrical worker.

Some short pieces of insulated wire were still attached, giving the appearance of an infernal machine.

Russell threw the cells into the vacant lot across the street to make sure they would do no damage, and then went out to look for the man who had caused the scare.

FAKE INSPECTORS LOOK AT METERS

METER TESTERS ARE REAPING A HARVEST BY A COMPLICATED LOOKING DEVICE WHICH WISELY NEVER FINDS AN ERROR—THE INSPECTOR ALSO GIVES TIPS ON TIPS.

Fake gas inspectors are operating in Minneapolis at present, and householders are warned that anyone offering to test the gas meter officially is a humbug.

W. H. Roberts, the city gas inspector, is the only person having any authority to test meters, and he is much more than about his business work.

Mr. Roberts says that it has been brought to his attention that two alleged inspectors are canvassing. The charge is \$1.50, but can be beaten down to \$1.00 by a somewhat complicated device and when they secure a job, immediately detach the meter, do something and pronounce the meter all right.

Warning is also given against a certain variety of aluminum "tips" which canvassers are introducing. Some of these have as their chief feature a fan in an hour or twice as much as a good burner should.

ALUMNI OFFERS A CLEVER SCHEME FOR ENLARGEMENT.

Would Have Condemned Land Between University Avenue and Railroad Tracks North of Campus and Erected New Main on University Avenue, Thus Saving Drill Ground.

If Charles B. Howland, a Duluth capitalist, had visited his alma mater one month sooner, the new main building of the University of Minnesota would not have been erected on the campus drillground, and the problem of more room for university buildings would have been solved.

Mr. Howland was graduated from the university in 1894 and since that time has become wealthy thru operations on the Mesaba iron range.

The plan was presented to several of the university authorities, but was not made public until today. It was seriously considered and it would have been accepted if had not been for the fact that plans for the new main had been drawn and arrangements made for laying the foundation.
