IOWA CORN CROP WILL DEFEAT RECORDS

IOWA'S YIELD IS ESTIMATED AT 390,418,630 BUSHEL.

Secretary of Grain Dealers' Association Makes Prediction After Careful Investigation of Reports Throught the State—Oats Output Also Shows Increase.

ESTIMATES OF IOWA CROPS. Total corn crop, 390,418,630 bushels. Yield per acre, 40 bushels. Total oat crop, 144,949,280 bushels. Yield per acre, 33 bushels. Previous estimate of corn crop, 348,000 bushels.

Special to The Journal. Webster City, Iowa, Oct. 18.—Iowa's corn crop this fall will reach the enormous total of 390,418,630 bushels, according to an announcement made by George A. Wells, secretary of the Iowa Grain Dealers' association.

The remarkable figures which are given are based upon an increased acreage, together with unmistakable evidence that the corn will average forty bushels to the acre. He not only predicts the biggest corn crop, but also predicts that the oat output will reach 144,949,280 bushels, at least 14,000,000 more bushels than conservative estimates heretofore had given.

BANKER'S TRIAL BEGINS

Ed C. Brown of Sheldon Is Charged with Fraudulent Banking.

SIOUX CITY, IOWA.—The trial of Ed C. Brown of Sheldon, Iowa, former banker and railroad commissioner charged with fraudulent banking, begins today in the district court at Frimghar, Iowa, Judge John F. Oliver presiding.

A number of prominent witnesses have been called, including Thomas A. Way of Britt, Judge Scott M. Ladd of Des Moines, Charles Stinson of Minneapolis, Ed W. Brown of Glenwood, Mont., and Emmet Brown of Miles City, Mont., the latter two being sons of the defendant.

Ed C. Brown now lives in Montana. During his residence in Iowa he was prominent politically and was regarded as an important factor in politics in his district.

SOUTH DAKOTA CONFERENCE OF DAKOTA METHODISTS BEGINS AT WATERTOWN.

Annual Meeting of Historical Society Also Convening and Rev. A. Jameson Tells the History of Methodism in the State—Sessions Start Today.

Rev. A. Jameson gave a short history of Methodism in South Dakota prior to 1882. He was a member of the first conference that ever assembled in this state and is the only member of that conference now connected with the present meeting.

Among other things he said that in 1873 there were but four or five appointments in South Dakota, and these were huddled together in the southeastern corner of the state. The Dakotas were at that time part of the northwestern conference, which in 1873 held its annual session in the city of Yankton.

The second church in South Dakota was built at Colfax. It was constructed of mud with a sod roof and served as a landmark for several years. In 1874 there were four appointments in the state—Yankton, Vermillion, Lead and Gayville.
