Newly Elected Board and Officers to Do Some Hustling in Promoting Improvements in East Minneapolis—Question of Club House to Be Settled Without Delay By Committee.

With a board of fifteen directors as a representative body of the best elements in the municipal and business life of the east side, the St. Anthony Falls Commercial club is fairly well started on its career.

The East Side needs a hospital, has been the verdict of many of the East Minneapolis physicians for years, and with the assistance of the new Commercial club, it is hoped by the medical men in the city to see their plan materialize.

In business and wholesale circles there has been a crying demand for a freight clearing house, and to the promotion committee of the club will fall the lot of furthering plans for such an institution.

East Minneapolis as a center of wholesale manufacturing has an enormous output of freight every year. At present freight has to be hauled across the river at an additional expense to the shipper and at a great loss of time.

With a freight house on the East Side such drawbacks would be at once eliminated.
