INTERSTATE COMMERCE LAW CONVENTION NOT APPROVED.

Board of Directors Issues Statement of Five Reasons for Opposing E. P. Bacon's Plan—Will Defeat Establishment of Reasonable, Effective and Desirable Regulation of Rates.
