THAT IS WHAT SOME EASTERNERS ASK.

"Jack" Bennett, Once the Most Popular Passenger Agent in the Northwest, Tells of Business in Slow Old Philadelphia, Where Business Hours Are from 10:30 to 3:30.

J. M. Bennett, district passenger agent of the Baltimore & Ohio railway and once upon a time the best-known and most popular passenger agent in the northwest, is in the city for a short time in behalf of his company.

"Minneapolis is the best inland city in the country," said Mr. Bennett today. "I don't say this because of a natural fondness for Minneapolis, but as an unprejudiced observer of practically all the growing cities of the country. One has only to return after an absence of a few years to realize how this town is advancing. It is bound to have a big future."

"The ignorance of some of the supposedly intelligent and well-informed people about the west is simply amazing. They want to know if they have streetcars in Minneapolis, and when I tell them that they do, they stand off and where Carpenter's hall was I realized that I was in the midst of a slower class of people than I had been accustomed to."
