

CLOSING SESSION OF UNIVERSALISTS

GENERAL CONVENTION ENDS WITH IMPRESSIVE MEETING.

Resolutions Expressing Gratitude for Entertainment Are Adopted by Delegates, and Former Mayor J. C. Haynes and Rev. M. D. Shutter Respond Feelingly, the Latter Paying Beautiful Tribute to His Wife.

At noon today the biennial general convention of the Universalist church finished its sessions at the Church of the Redeemer, to meet again two years from now at the Church of the Restoration, Philadelphia.

The closing exercises were impressive. Former Mayor J. C. Haynes, in the name of the laymen of the Church of the Redeemer, expressed the pleasure experienced in entertaining the delegates. He believed the convention had been beneficial to every one; to the Universalist church at large, to the convention delegates, and to the city of Minneapolis.

Unfinished Business. This morning was devoted to various items of unfinished business. A resolution was presented and unanimously adopted, "that the beautiful hospitality of our generous hosts, the pastor and people of the Church of the Redeemer and others associated with them, command our gratitude; and we desire to express our appreciation of their uniform courtesy and kindness. We shall bear to our homes most gracious and lasting memories of Minneapolis, and cherish her people as proven friends."

Rev. Thomas B. Payne of Scranton, Pa., president of the John Murray association, told of having secured an option at \$3,500 on the original gray homestead and acres Good Luck, N. J., and hoped subscriptions would before long come into his hands not only for its purchase, but for the erection of a suitable memorial to the founder of the church.
