SLIDES DOWN TANK AS GAS EXPLODES

Workingman Makes Sensational Escape in Wreck of Duluth Company's Plant.

Duluth, Oct. 27.—Hans Nicholson, a laborer employed at the Northwestern Boiler works, made a sensational slide for life from the top of the gas holder at the Zenith Furnace company's gas plant in Garfield avenue yesterday afternoon, when an explosion of 175,000 feet of gas wrecked the big telescope and shook the ground for blocks around. Nicholson felt a series of rapid shocks before the flames shot thru the steel covering, and made a hurried descent by means of a rope. The flames caught him just as he crawled over the edge of the crater, and his clothing and hat were burned and his face blistered by the heat. His injuries are not of a dangerous nature.

Leaks of a powerful current of electricity caused by a short circuit, either in the light or power wires on Garfield avenue, were reported about two hours before the explosion. It is believed that the current followed the supply main into the holder, when it sparked and caused the explosion, as there was no other means, it is said, for the fire to have entered the holder.

Engineer Harper, employed by the department, who was at work near the holder at the time of the accident, says it was preceded by heavy rumbling. The sheet of flame which burst out thru the ripped portion of the top reached a height of probably 300 feet. The holder has a diameter of 30 feet. Each of the "telescoped" sections is 20 feet in height, the upper being telescoped into the lower, which is submerged in water.

Immediately following the explosion, which released the pressure within, the holders fell with a crash into the water pit.

HUGHES' SCHEME YIELDS A PROFIT

Utopian Idea Lost, but Business Pays \$2 for Every \$1 Invested.

Louisville, Ky., Oct. 27.—After twenty-five years the somewhat utopian idea of Thomas E. Hughes, or Tom Hughes, as all the world knew him, the author of "Tom Brown at Oxford," "Tom Brown at Rugby," etc., regarded as classics in English literature, for the establishment of a sort of refuge for educated but impecunious Englishmen, has received fruition, but in a way scarcely dreamed of by the distinguished author and philanthropist. What is of greater moment, perhaps, is the fact that the stockholders in the original company will soon receive \$2 for every \$1 invested, with the likelihood of a still further increase.

Along in the early eighties of the last century Hughes conceived the idea of the founding in America of a colony for British sons. At that time his personal popularity was so great that he encountered no serious difficulty in organizing a company, which bought 100,000 acres of land on a beautiful plateau of the river Cumberland. The outlay was about \$250,000, and the laying of the cornerstone of the first house in Rugby was made the occasion of a great demonstration, in which Mr. Hughes and several governors of the states took a hand.

Original Scheme a Failure.

The whole English-speaking world looked on with interest. Mr. Hughes' intent was that our cousins across the herring pond should have the advantages of the "bawth," the club and the bounds. The Englishmen came all right enough, but while they showed great familiarity with the "bawth," they were utterly at sea when it came to making money. The enterprise was a flat failure. Mr. Hughes came over again in 1887, but his presence was of no avail. The colony consistently lost money.

Then the English began to go out and the Americans to come in, at first for health, and then for profit. They secured leases on the property and began to develop it. Negotiations are now pending between the new settlers and English owners looking to the purchase of the entire tract. It is rich in coal and iron, and if the Englishmen sell now they will receive \$2 for every one originally invested. This is on the authority of Robert Walton, manager of the Rugby company, limited, who is looking after matters connected with the sale.

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TRAILS TO OPEN FOREST RESERVES

Washington, Oct. 27.—During the coming winter and spring many miles of trails will be built in the government forest reserves. One of the chief cares of the forest service is the management of the reserves is to protect them against fire. The trails will afford a means of reaching all parts of the forest reserves on horseback and the fire lines will form vantage points from which the fire may be attacked or against which it may be directed and there controlled.

There are already many miles of trails in the various reserves, but most of them are rough, in poor condition or not passable for horses. The trails to be built will be carefully planned and constructed with an easy grade. This does not involve much expense, for in many situations a perfectly good trail can be built for \$20 a mile and many miles will cost less than \$5. The work will be directed by the regular forest officers and the rangers themselves will perform most of the labor.

There is no question but that these trails will prove of inestimable value in protecting the forest reserves. Many of them will also be worth as much more in making regions accessible to hunters and prospectors which are now almost entirely beyond reach.


SHOT IN A MELODRAMA

HONEST GRAFT IS NEW YORK TERM

IVINS TELLS "HOW MURPHY GOT IT" AND GIVES THIS AS MEANS.

New York, Oct. 27.—"Honest graft" is a picturesque term which has come to the front in the municipal campaign. It is likely to spread over the country and its origin is interesting. The phrase "honest graft" is the product of the fertile brain of George W. Plunkitt, the veteran Tammany man who for many years was a Tammany district leader and a Tammany senator. Plunkitt expatiated upon it in a recent published book by William L. Riordan—"Plunkitt of Tammany Hall"—which devotes a chapter to the subject. In this chapter Plunkitt explains "honest graft" as follows:

"There is an honest graft, and I am an example of how it works. My party is in power in the city and it is going to undertake a lot of public improve-

ments. I am tipped off on the place. I go to that place and buy up all the land I can. Then the board of this or that makes its plan public and there is a rush to get my land which nobody cared particularly for before. Ain't it perfectly honest to charge a good price and make a profit on my investment and foresight? Oh, it is. Well, that is honest graft."

In his breezy and picturesque style, William M. Ivins, the republican candidate for mayor, gives his definition of "honest graft," and says Charles F. Murphy, leader of Tammany Hall, got his country place at Good Grounds by means of it.

"Honest graft," said Mr. Ivins, "means the result of early knowledge which makes politicians speculate for themselves thru their official positions. It is just such 'honest graft' as is shown by the conduct of the life insurance companies as brought out by the legislative investigation. It enables individuals to make private fortunes out of public improvements."
