CITY NEWS

NO REASON TO SHELVE TARIFF

GOVERNOR CUMMINGS OF IOWA WANTS EARLY REVISION.

Does Not See Why Railroad Rate Question Should Exclude Consideration of Tariff Changes—Both Need to Be Settled and Should Be Worked Out This Winter.

"No issue is entitled to special precedence or rank," said Governor A. B. Cummings of Iowa today. "I see no reason why the questions of tariff revision and railroad rate regulation should not be discussed and settled at the same time. If a measure is right it is right, and I cannot see why one needs to wait for settlement of the other."

Governor Cummings arrived in St. Paul this morning, and will speak at the banquet of the St. Paul Roosevelt club tonight. The question of tariff revision will be treated in his address, but he does not intend to confine himself to any set subject.

A visit was paid to the state capitol, Congressman Stevens and Hugh T. Halbert, president of the Roosevelt club, escorting the Iowa governor. They called on Governor Johnson, who accompanied them in an inspection of the building.

To a Journal man, Governor Cummings expressed himself emphatically when asked about the proposition to shelve tariff revision in favor of railroad legislation this winter.

"I have understood that is the disposition of some of our senators and congressmen," he said. "They do not want tariff revision at all, and are using the urgency of the railroad question as an excuse for putting the other matter over. I see no reason why one question should wait for the other. I am heartily in favor of granting increased powers to the interstate commerce commission, as the president urges, and I have made fifty speeches this summer in support of that reform. But I do not consider it paramount or demands exclusive attention."

Governor Cummings was asked what he thought of the pending convention of shippers in Chicago.

"The gentlemen who regard government control of rates as dangerous had a perfect right to meet and express their sentiments, but business men's action may be taken for what it is worth."

Speaking of the factional troubles among Iowa farmers, the governor says: "Our troubles are much exaggerated. We have our little disagreements within the party, and after we have fought them out, whichever side is licked, a man will eventually be a good republican. I have faith that the republican party will keep right, and that we will continue harmonious. Of course, I cannot undertake to lift the curtain that hides the future."

QUITS CONSULAR SERVICE

RAYMOND E. FRAZIER SAYS IT IS TOO UNCERTAIN TO ATTRACT YOUNG MEN.

Raymond E. Frazier, who is in process of retiring as United States consul at Copenhagen, is in the city for a few days and today visited the city hall with Louis S. Swenson, its minister to Denmark. Although he has an excellent position for a young man, Mr. Frazier is retiring from the consular service because the future is too uncertain.

"I find that the average length of service of those who enter Uncle Sam's consular service is six years," said Mr. Frazier. "There is no inducement for anyone to remain when business opportunities, with the certainty of establishing one's self in a good position, are constantly presenting themselves. The European system is much better, for once in either the consular or diplomatic service, the appointment is for life. With reasonable application and industry, a man will eventually secure a fairly good position. The advancement may be slow, but at any rate it is sure and the tenure is certain. I know that all I can expect is a dismissal at any time, and I have become valuable to my government and this dismissal might come at a time when another position might not be easy to get, so I decided to anticipate the fatal day which is surely coming."

OPPOSE LATE SHAVES

Barbers' Union Strengthens Itself for Early-Closing Fight.

In an effort to restore uniform closing hours for downtown barber shops, the Minneapolis Barbers' union, in an enthusiastic meeting last night, was attended by nearly every non-union barber in the city, made sweeping reductions in its initiation fees for a term of sixty days, and pledged itself to secure all non-union barbers in pending suits to engage in business with the union. The offer of the union members to cut the \$5 initiation fee to \$1.00, and their apparent purpose to aid the non-union barbers, brought the latter to their feet in an almost unanimous desire to become union men.

The action of the union men was prompted by the irregular closing hours of downtown barber shops, which were kept open until 8 o'clock and later on week days, while the union closing hour is 7 p.m. It is thought that the step of the non-union men who represented every important shop will cause an agreement among the masters to close promptly at the appointed hour.

THE FEARED HAMMER.

Eva E. Wise has begun an action for divorce against Anthony Wise, and yesterday secured from Judge Andrew Holt an order restraining the defendant from interfering with his wife or family in any way until the final adjudication of the case. Mrs. Wise alleges that the defendant has treated her in a consistently cruel and harsh manner, and has for some time past kept a hammer in their sleeping room. She claims that also Mr. Wise would not say what he intended doing with this hammer, she feared and believed that he meant to use it to murder her some time when his temper was aroused. There are nine children.

WHOLESALE SEIZURE MADE.

Five barrels of fish and a trunk full of ducks were seized in St. Paul yesterday by a deputy game warden. The fish were shipped from Stillwater, and were confiscated, but the ducks were not held. They had been shipped from Devils Lake, N. D., and as there is a case pending before the supreme court involving the right to ship game in from another state, it was decided to await the outcome of that appeal.


SENATORS NOT MEETING SEVERAL STATE POLITICIANS TURN UP IN ST. PAUL TODAY, HOWEVER.

There was no evidence in St. Paul today of a gathering of state senators. The proposed meeting has been called off for the present, on account of the newspapers "flushing" it. There were several politicians from outside in St. Paul, however, among them W. A. Nolan of Grand Meadow, a member of the house who aspires to lieutenant governor. Julius Schmoll of Redwood Falls, James A. Larson of Walnut Grove and P. J. Schwarz of Dodge Center were in St. Paul together. Messrs. Larson and Schwarz were on their way to attend the state land sale at Roseau tomorrow, but missed connections and will not get there. Both are former house members, and Larson is mentioned for successor to Senator Somerville in the Brown-Redwood district. Schwarz was a candidate for state treasurer last year, and may try again, but declined to state his intentions today. CHEESE SCORED HIGH. First prize in the October cheese scoring contest, conducted by the state dairy and food department, was taken by G. Andriat of Berne, with a score of 97 1/2. F. M. Bennett of Litchfield came second with 97, and H. Clement of Tembourose, third, with 96 1/2. There were nine entries and all scored 94 or over.
