REAL WAR WITH BULLETS ABSENT

PROBLEMS AT FORT SNELLING JUST LIKE THE REAL THING.

Blues, Under Major Allen, Attack Browns, Commanded by Major Bullard, and Drive Them from Strong Position After Several Hours' Hard Fighting—Last Problem to Be Handled Today.

Yesterday was the culmination of the series of tactical problems that has been worked out this fall at Fort Snelling. The personal staff and department staff of the department commander, General C. C. Carr, and the two members of congress from this vicinity, with many other visitors, saw the problem worked out by two of the cleverest tacticians in the army.

The operations in all of these problems are as near to actual warfare as it is possible to get without the use of bullets and shells. Yesterday's problem, in which Major Allen commanded the Blues and Major Bullard the Browns, involved the Blue attack of the Browns' successive positions, at the delay of the Blues' advance as long as possible by the Browns.

Major Allen began the attack from the target butts on the new rifle range. He made an ostentatious attack against the Brown right, over open ground, with his left wing, while the right of the Blues sneaked along the bluff on the Minnesota river to get on the flank of the Browns. The movement was successful; but at considerable cost to the Blue left. The Browns had skillfully concealed a battery of artillery in the brush west of the new cemetery, with which they had been able to catch a portion of the Blue left. Half this Blue wing was ruled out by the chief umpire, Captain John H. Parker, and the rest sent back 500 yards.

Seeing that both his flanks were threatened, especially his right, Major Bullard pivoted his rearward movement upon his own right flank, withdrawing by ejection from the left. This left his right flank to bear the brunt of a determined attack made upon it by the battalion of Blues, commanded at this point by Lieutenant Price, but who encountered a most stubborn Brown resistance at the hands of Lieutenant Greer, with a single company. This company concealed itself in a little ravine so well that the Blues' left wing with a sharp volley, causing heavy loss a second time.

Bullard now made a new stand upon the old target butt hill, north of the fort; his right resting on the target butt, and his left on old reservoir hill, with two of his guns at each position. He also put one company in a cut in the old abandoned Minnehaha road, guarding the center.

Meantime, Major Allen, crowded forward to a favorable position from which to assault the old target butt, holding the fringe of timber from the new magazine west to the boundary. At the same time he advanced his artillery along the road thru the fort, to a position near the cavalry stables. During this advance the Browns caught him by the dust raised by his artillery in rapid motion, and he suffered a light artillery loss from a few well-directed shells. Having seized this artillery position, he now pushed his right flank forward under the bluff, this bluff being the Mississippi, on his favorite turning movement against the left flank of the enemy, whom he forced by this shrewd maneuver, out of their strong position on old reservoir hill, back on Minnehaha.

It was certain that the end of the problem showed Major Allen in possession of the strategic position of old reservoir hill, from which it was only a matter of time and patience to drive the Browns off the reservation, tho there were still several hard nuts to crack.

There is one more problem to be solved, which will close the maneuver instruction of this season.

Colonel W. L. Pletcher, Twenty-eighth infantry, was a highly interested spectator of yesterday's maneuvers. Colonel Pletcher commanded the force that cleaned up the island of Mindoro, in the Philippines. He expressed himself as very highly pleased with the work, saying that it was the finest instruction he has ever seen at any post in nearly forty years' service.

FACTORY PROTESTS

Opposes Railroad Move to Raise Rates on Lumber.

The Hopkins rate case was taken up again yesterday by the railroad and warehouse commission, on the application of the railroads to restore the old lumber rate of 3 1/2 cents a hundred. The commission a short time ago ordered the open rate made \$5 a car, which has been the rate enjoyed by the Minneapolis Threshing Machine company since it started.

F. E. Kenaston, president of the company, appeared to protest against the advance. He showed that when the plan was built there was a verbal agreement with the railroads that he would pay only the \$5 a car as a switching charge. A higher rate would put them at a disadvantage in competition with eastern factories which have low thru rates and pay no local freight charges on raw materials. The plan was established at Hopkins with the understanding that it would be treated the same as Minneapolis in rates.

Further time was asked and the hearing was adjourned to give opportunity for conference between the railroad officials and the threshing machine company's officials.

MANY HEAR EVANGELISTS

LARGE AUDIENCES GATHER AT REVIVAL MEETINGS AT DOWNTOWN CHURCH SERVICES.

Evangelist Henry Ostrom of the Chapman corps of revivalists addressed a large audience, composed mostly of women, at the First Baptist church yesterday afternoon. The church was well filled and the service was followed with marked interest and feeling by the audience. Mr. Ostrom's subject was "Faith."

In his opening address, the evangelist briefly outlined the progress of the present world-wide revival, declaring that there had been nothing like it for fifty years or more. "Either this world is waking up or it is the greatest fraud of the ages," said Mr. Ostrom. "I tell you it is a movement from above. It comes from above and it operates from above. The weapons that God uses thru us are not carnal but spiritual. Not by might nor by power but by my spirit, saith the God of Hosts."

In speaking of the importance and necessity of faith, he said: "Faith is the higher reason. It is a view of the future that lifts a man up out of his pretty self and makes him a larger, taller man morally and spiritually."

"The principal hindrance to faith," said he, "is the unforgiving spirit. Do you know that if it were possible to make all church members love one another with a truly Christ-like love, I could add a million new members before next Sunday night. It is the church members with their uncharitableness and their hatred of one another that stand in the way of most revivals and make them so unsuccessful."

Mr. Ostrom's address was preceded by a fifteen-minute song service, under the leadership of J. P. Hillis, who also sang several solos. Sunday afternoon Mr. Ostrom will address a men's meeting under the auspices of the Y. M. C. A., his subject being "The Everyday Man." Mr. Hillis will also sing.

Rev. C. T. Schaeffer, another of the Chapman workers, gave his stereoscopic lecture, "From Atlanta to the Sun-set Sea," at Wesley church last evening. The church was filled to the galleries, tho the lecture has been given before in the city. The churches of the downtown district combined to make the meeting a union service. R. Schaeffer will repeat the lecture this evening at the Thirteenth Avenue Methodist church.

Rev. W. B. Riley of the First Baptist church led a union prayer service last evening at Hennepin Avenue church.
