NEW INDUSTRY MAY BEGIN OPERATIONS IN MAY MONTHS. Benton County Enterprise Expends \$200,000 in Erecting Modern Plant to Insure a Capacity of Forty-five Tons a Day—Suspension Bridge to Be Constructed. WISCONSIN CENSUS REVEALS SEVERAL CHANGES

BADGER STATE SHOWS NET GAIN OF 159,907. Total Population of Wisconsin is 2,228,949, with Milwaukee Still in Lead of Cities and Superior Second—Kenosha Passes Four and Oshkosh One. Special to The Journal. Madison, Wis., Nov. 3.—The total population of the state of Wisconsin is 2,228,949, as shown by the completed compilation of the census announced by Secretary of State Houser. The net gain over 1900 is 159,907. In 1900 the total population was 2,069,042. The rate of growth of the population of the state for the last five years has been 7.7 per cent. The rate of increase in the five years between 1895 and 1900 was 22.7 per cent. In 171-two of the seventy-one counties of the badger state were reported aggregating 106,127. In nineteen counties there were losses aggregating 6,220, the resultant net gain of the state being 157,907.

MCKAY FALLS VIOTM

Bullet Fired at Wisconsin State Senator Strikes Railroad Man. WAUSAU, WIS.—J. A. McKay, head leader for the St. Paul road in Wisconsin, will probably die in place of State Senator James A. Wright, at whom a bullet was fired yesterday afternoon at Menomonie by Marshall Lloyd. McKay was shot in the chest while playing cards with Wright. Wright fired the shot and turned the muzzle away just as Lloyd pulled the trigger. The bullet missed Wright, but indicated a probably fatal wound on McKay. Special trains with doctors from Merrill and McKay's family from Wausau were sent out by the road of which McKay was an employee.
