W. S. NOTT CO. BUYS TO SUCCEED R. F. JONES GAME BACK TO SMASH EMPLOYMENT OFFICE

A WAREHOUSE SITE BUILDING TO BE ERECTED ON SECOND AVENUE NORTH.

The Structure Will Be Five Stories in Height, and Will Cost at Least \$125,000—Work Begins in Spring and Structure Will Be Occupied Next October.

The W. S. Nott company has just purchased thru Thorpe Bros., from J. E. Bell, the property on the southwest corner of Second avenue N. and Third street, 132 feet on Third street, 177 feet on Second avenue, for \$60,000. The company intends to erect a large five-story warehouse in the spring, costing somewhere between \$125,000 and \$150,000. It is expected to occupy the new quarters about next October.

The company also expect to make an addition to its fire department factory—the Nott Fire Engine company—which is now located at 1039 Central avenue, there being about three months' work ahead at the present time, with ten engines to be shipped to the following cities: New York, City; 3; Buffalo, N. Y.; 1; Milwaukee, Wis.; 1; Paterson, N. J.; 2; Newport Naval Station (U. S. Government); 1; La Crosse, Wis.; 1; Spokane, Wash., 1.

CAMPAIGN FOR FUNDS St. Paul Y. M. C. A. Is Bound to Have a New Building.

St. Paul's Y. M. C. A. last evening launched its campaign to secure \$200,000 for a new association building at a dinner at the Commercial club. George M. Tibbs was elected chairman of a business men's committee to solicit funds for the new building.

PRINCIPALS SHIFTED Vacancy Caused by Miss Jennison's Death Makes Changes Necessary.

Miss Jean L. Gowdy, principal of the Washington school for seven years, will succeed the late Miss Clara E. Jennison as principal of the Logan school. The Logan is a larger school than the Washington, having three more rooms and the transfer is in the nature of a promotion for Miss Gowdy. Several changes naturally result. Anna B. Stewart, principal of the Lyndale school for ten years, is transferred to the Washington school; Kate J. Barker goes from the Logan to the Lyndale; Marthe L. Hussey from the Lake Harriet to the Marcy and Mary C. Bruce from the Laurel to the Lake Harriet. Ellis M. Probst, principal at the Bromfield, is promoted to principal at the Laurel school, a small, four-room building.

ROBBED BY CREEK That Is Claim of Edward Coughlin in Interesting Boundary Suit.

The first case to be tried in Minnesota under the new system, where the boundary line of a piece of land has been in dispute, has been brought in the district court by Edward Coughlin, represented by Judge J. R. Coughlin, against the Minnesota Debenture company.

JUDGE SCORES FOWBLE Man Who Took Sashes from House Pays Fine.

Charles A. Fowble, a contractor, living at 963 Burr street, St. Paul, was given a scathing rebuke by Judge Hine in the St. Paul municipal court yesterday, and in addition was fined \$25 for thirty days. Fowble was charged by Louis Leonhart with disorderly conduct. Fowble ordered Leonhart to vacate the house which he rented of the former. Leonhart promised to do so, but before he had time to find another house, Fowble removed the lower sashes in the twelve windows, exposing the Leonhart family, including a baby 1 year old.

ATTACK WILDER AGAIN Relatives Make Another Attempt to Secure Charity Bequest.

Relatives of Mrs. Fanny S. Wilder made a new move yesterday to break her will and that of her daughter, Mrs. Cornelia Day Wilder Appleby, providing for the establishment of the Wilder charity for the wider poor of St. Paul. Suits were brought by the heirs in the United States circuit court to have both wills declared void, in so far as they relate to the charity.

DON C. DONNAN BECOMES MANAGING EDITOR OF THE HORSEMAN AND STOCKMAN.

Charles Anderson and John Horst didn't like the way a Bridge square employment agency did business, so they started in early this morning to put the place out of the running.

The two men assert that a few days ago positions were offered them in Illinois, near their own homes. They paid the agency \$5 each and received their transportation. Being unable to read, they did not notice that their tickets were for Sioux City, Iowa. When the conductor came for the tickets they asked if they were on the right train, and learning that they had been duped, got off the train and returned to Minneapolis. Going directly to the agency, they began operations. The job-seekers took possession of the agency and the proprietors were about to follow suit when the police interfered and arrested the belligerents.

MODEL CLOTHING HOUSE GETS STATE CONTRACT

The awarding of the contract for 1,000 new dress coats for the Minnesota National Guard to the Boston Clothing house of St. Paul, and of that for the same number of caps to the Model clothing house of Minneapolis, marks a new departure, as these are the first clothing contracts to be awarded to Minnesota firms. The bids were opened by the board, consisting of Governor E. John A. Johnson, Adjutant General F. B. Wood and General Joseph Bobleter of New Ulm. The awards are regarded as a substantial recognition of the work and standing of the two houses.

HIGHWAYMAN SLUGS WOMAN IN ST. PAUL

Miss Maud Bailey, living at 67 College avenue, St. Paul, was dragged into an alley near Sixth and Minnesota streets, St. Paul, and slugged and robbed early last evening.

Her assailant was a young man scarcely 20 years old, and he had followed her for some distance before making the attack. She was on her way to the Metropolitan theater and as she passed the alley the man, garbing her by the arm, dragged her several feet into the shadow of the building. There he struck her a powerful blow on the head and wrenching her purse from her hand, ran farther into the alley.

Miss Bailey's screams attracted C. Montgomery and George Colburn, who went to her rescue, and as the alley was a blind one, they caught the robber as he was returning. He was compelled to give the purse to his victim and was then turned over to the police. He gave his name as A. P. Barry.

VICTIM OF ROBBERS IDENTIFIES SUSPECT

Hans Nelson, a transient, was beaten and robbed of \$95 in the entrance of a Bridge square employment agency, last night and Harry Day, 50 years old, is held as one of the assailants.

Nelson arrived in the city yesterday morning and fell in with Day and another stranger. The three went out in the evening to see the town, and as they entered the hallway to go up to his friends, Nelson was suddenly attacked by his friends. He showed one of them down, but while holding his assailant on his back the second man went thru his pockets. Taking all his money, they ran toward the street.

Early in the evening Day had been picked up by Detectives Wirtensohn and Lyons on suspicion of being a vagrant. He had no money, but was allowed to go. When Nelson reported the robbery the detectives made the rounds of the downtown saloons. As they entered Mike Russo's saloon at Hennepin avenue and Second street, Day was just getting a \$5 high chair. When he noticed the officers he started for the rear door, throwing \$90 in bills into the corner. The officers pinned him to the floor and later he was taken to Central station. Here he was positively identified by Nelson as the man who went thru his pockets.

Day refused to talk to the officers, and the identity of the other man has not been learned.

TRIES FOUR TIMES Life Prisoner Makes Another Effort to Secure Pardon.

A renewed application for pardon has been made by William Fitzsimmons, a life prisoner at Stillwater. Fitzsimmons was sentenced from Pine county, and made his first application to the board in 1889. Three times he has been refused, but the fourth application was made yesterday by his attorney, A. A. Caswell of Anoka.


