

BY GRACE OF A FIELD GOAL DID BADGERS TRIUMPH OVER THEIR ANCIENT GOPHER FOES

Minnesota, Battling to Her Utmost, Beaten but Not Disgraced—Great Game Full of Sensational Plays.

but they were of the distance-gaining variety all the time. His line-plunging was one of the bright spots over which the gophers were exchanging reminiscences last night. On defense "Brother Bill" seemed able to stop almost anything that came his way...

Two Great Elevens Almost Equally Matched—Cutting and Findley the Chief Heroes of Memorable Game.

The work of the officials was satisfactory. Every rule was enforced right up to the letter and while the gophers caught more of the punishment of distance thru their activity than did their rivals, there was no complaint...

Man for man from end to end of the line the gophers had a shade the better of it. Wisconsin's backfield was the superior in weight and there lies the whole situation.

Melmer played a good quarter, altho he did not shine as a distance kicker. He directed his play at the weak spot in the gopher line and varied it with trials on the end. The end runs were not successful in the main, altho the two touchdowns came from this resort.

Wanderboom's Work.

Vanderboom, the left half, was called upon to do a great deal of the ball-carrying and did not play as sensational a game as he did last year, when he was the star of the team. He made terrific plunges and got into every formation as a pusher or puller...

Wisconsin's Three Stars.

The laurels for Wisconsin were worn by three men—Findley, Roseth and Melzner. Brindley at left end did not carry the ball but a few times and Burkan generally got him out of the way when anything was coming in that side of the line...


Kjelland's Plucky Battle.

Who Made Good Wisconsin's Touchdowns.



SIDE-LINE SCENES OF THE GREAT GAME

Holt and King, Wisconsin's long and short of it, were conspicuous by contrast as they nervously paced up and down the side lines during the now historic struggle. Assistant Coach Holt looked like Phil's father and when the two came together for a hurried word—usually one of congratulation—Phil looked up at the big one in a confiding sort of way that conveyed the impression that perhaps the head coach really was a confidence man...

The Team Play.

Minnesota's team play was the best of the year. The men played fast and tier was only once when there was any noticeable confusion in getting into the formations. Individually the men played good football. Marshall was a whirlwind on defense at left end, but did not do anything notable on offense. He is usually a strong man at carrying the ball, but yesterday, when he did make his attempts, he picked up but few yards. He was persistent in breaking thru and spoiling attempts at his end of the line, but was not called on for a great deal of ball-carrying duty. His gains were not long.

Strong on Offense.

The play indicated that both of the teams were stronger on offense than on defense. When Wisconsin had the ball, Itner, Brush, Cutting and Curran seemed to be able to gain almost anywhere on the badger line. When the badgers were attacking, the favored plan was to call on Roseth, Melzner, Bertke back and take a straight plunge into the line. The badger offense was a great deal faster than it was in the Chicago game two weeks ago, and still retaining its grinding quality...

Findley Wisconsin's Star.

Findley was the star of the Wisconsin team in getting the two long runs for touchdowns. These came in the first half. Five men came shooting around Minnesota's right end in interference and these took care of Burkan and Kremer in both instances. Weisel was in as quarter and on the first run got to Findley for a leg tackle, only to be thrown off. Findley, with all kinds of interference to help him, raced down the field and twice planted the ball back of the gophers' goal.

Cutting Is Strong.

Joe Cutting at left half is the biggest little man in football clothes in the west today. He was responsible for a lot of anxiety for Bush and Brindley, and when he finally did make his escape for his long run down the sideline he put his soul into his legs and his stubby underpinning worked faster than ever before in his life. He looked neither to right nor left. He saw only that Wisconsin's goal.

Itner Making Minnesota's First Touchdown.

Itner played another star game. There was hardly a time during the afternoon when the big fellow did not rip a wide hole thru the badger line, when he was called on to do ball-carrying duty. His gains were not long.

Quarterbacks Played Well.

Larkin and Weisel had the quarterback position. Weisel started in the play and ran the team at a stiff clip. His passing was above criticism and in negotiating the first touchdown his generalship was good. Thus followed a fumble that put the ball close to Wisconsin's goal, but Weisel sent it over with mechanical precision. He was clean on handling his punts and usually picked up not a few yards in running the ball back. Standing back of Kjelland and supporting the center trio proved too much for Larkin, who played an equally good game to the close. Larkin had had luck again on two of his punts, but on kicking sent the ball higher and further than did Melzner. In fact, both of the Minnesota quarters outplayed their badger rival.

Brush Took Terrific Pounding.

Brush took terrific pounding at the left tackle position and went thru the game in good shape. He shared with Itner the distinction of ripping great gains in Wisconsin's line. On defense he was like a brick under the hat upon the sidewalk and few gains were made over him or by him. The play demonstrates, beyond a doubt, that in Brush and Itner Minnesota has two of the greatest tackles in the west.
