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LIMITED RESERVE CAUSES SELLING

EARLY DEMAND FOR PROMINENT SPECIALTIES IS STRONG.

Spirited Buying of Consolidated Gas Carries Prices Higher After the Opening—Appearance of Bank Statement Followed by Orderly Disposition of Stocks Through List.

New York, Nov. 11.—Several of the specialties made sharp advances in the opening dealings, but changes in the general list were irregular and slight.

Except for the congested demand for some of the recently prominent specialties, little progress was made higher level was achieved before the market became heavy in sympathy with an attack on the local traction.

The bank statement, showing reserves below the 25 per cent legal limit, precipitated heavy selling all through the list.
