## WOMEN ARE SCORNED

Panama Canal Commission Wants only Male Stenographers.

No women blondes are wanted in the offices of Panama Canal commission and women brunettes are also persona non grata. The examination for appointments as stenographers and typewriters is open to men only. It will be held on Dec. 13. From the list of those who make good in this test appointments will be made as vacancies occur. The salary is from \$1,200 to \$1,500 a year.

## SMALL TRADESMEN

### 'O.K.' CLOSE SUNDAY

#### DEALERS UNANIMOUS IN TESTIMONY AS TO ITS ADVANTAGES.

Canvass of Business Centers North and South Reveals General Belief that Reputable Business Concerns Will Profit by New System—Better Sunday Dinners in Workingmen's Homes.

Detail dealers in the residence districts and within the patrol limits are unanimous in their endorsement of Mayor Jones' order closing the Sunday saloons. A canvass of business centers north and south failed to reveal a single dissent among the small army of reputable dealers who were interviewed. Some declared that they had had no visible proof as yet of a benefit to their business, but all agreed that Sunday is certain in a short time to stimulate reputable trade and lift the quality of citizenship.

In the neighborhood of Twentieth and Washington avenues, where a little city of stores is heavily dotted with saloons, not a dealer, outside the ranks of the saloon men, opposes Mayor Jones' act. One grocer said:

"I welcome the order. It will not only raise the morals of this district, but every reputable storekeeper in this section will derive great benefit. Of course the order has not been in effect long enough to work any appreciable change in business, but I am positive that within six months every dealer on this street and the adjacent streets will be back of Mayor Jones for the good he has done among us, regardless of other sentiment or politics. I am a Jones man; I helped put him in office and you may think my views are prejudiced; but I can assure you that I have seen other business men, some of whom are of different political views, and find that every man approves the order."

#### Better Sunday Dinners.

"As I say, the order has as yet had no general effect on business. As yet I noticed several workingmen who, I know, have been in the habit of frequenting Sunday saloons, laying in meat and groceries for their last Sunday's dinner. Their orders exceeded in quantity and quality any orders they have placed for some weeks. I believe that this practice will grow, for, having no saloon to visit, the man will remain at home and will observe the fare his family has put up with. The families of the Sunday-saloon frequenters will derive benefit in this way.

"The order will have little effect on the credit business, for we trust very few persons out here. Our business is run on a cash basis, because we are compelled to compete with the larger downtown stores. But Sunday closing is a highly interesting matter, because more money will be available.

"The mayor's order has already had a telling effect on the morals of the community. I noticed myself and others with whom I discussed the question among them a policeman, declared: 'that this section was far more quiet and orderly since the first saloon was established in the neighborhood years ago.'

#### Will Enlarge His Plant.

A baker and confectioner in the same district was probably the staunchest adherent of Mayor Jones. He did not confess his political faith, but declared that his Sunday business had already experienced an increase of 25 per cent and added that the money diverted to him from the saloon business, "does not go to such ends as that spent in the saloons."

"I am going to build a building of my own in a short time now," said this man. This closing of the Sunday saloon has been one of the primary agencies in making possible this plan I have long cherished. We believe that the good effect of the order will cause every reputable business man in the city to demand its permanent enactment, and account of this belief are willing to invest our earnings out here."

#### South Siders Pleased.

As surprising as were the statements made by upper Washington avenue dealers, the reporters were completely taken aback when the same sentiments were expressed by Washington avenue business men. These men, who number among their best customers saloon men, brewery employees and the hundreds who are relatives or close friends of the former, are as well pleased over Sunday closing as are the dealers on the other side of Hennepin avenue. "The former, these men dare not permit the use of their names for the reason that they might alienate many of their customers, but one man expressed the sentiment of several others when he said:

"We have customers in both ranks. We do not antagonize either class, but on the promise that your source will be kept confidential, I will say that I and several dealers on either side of me welcome the order that has closed the Sunday saloon. Of course, men who crave liquor will have it on Sunday, but the money expended will be a good deal more wisely spent than that spent in the saloon thru the treating system, and we reputable dealers will get a good share of the difference. Of course, the reform is too new to have had any evident effect on quantity of business, but in six months it will be recognized as a great stimulant of legitimate trade."

Confectionery dealers seem to have been the immediate beneficiaries of the order. They testify their approval of the close Sunday and the diversion to them of money hitherto spent for liquor. They argue that Sunday business is their forte, but that the saloon habit had deprived them of the trade they need on that day to make their business profitable.

## HAVE PROTECTION ENOUGH

### SENATOR CLAPP DOES NOT THINK WHITE BARTH INDIANS NEED ANY TIMBER SALE.

"I do not believe there will be any sale of timber on the White Earth reservation," said Senator Clapp today. "I expect at the coming sale on Wednesday to see all bids rejected, and then no other sale will be ordered. It is not necessary." The Indians sold timber last winter without such restrictions, and got good prices. All sales are subject to the approval of the Indian department, and there is no danger that they will fail to get what is worth. There is no use in restricting the number of mills that may be built on the reservation. The more mills put in the better prices the Indians will get for their timber."


#### Senator Clapp says he will not go

Several months ago the federal authorities asked the police to look for the swindlers. The bills passed were of \$1 denomination, raised at \$3 and \$10. Detective Joseph Rhodes and Captain George Sinclair have been working on the case for some time and yesterday they had almost given up hope. ## NEW SPECIFICATIONS FOR GAS LIGHTING

New specifications for incandescent street lighting were prepared by the council committee on gas yesterday. The old specifications were not materially altered.

The bidders will be required to light all the gas lamps in the city, about 5,600, but in case the award is not secured by the holder of the present contract, the successful bidder will have until Feb. 1 to install the incandescent lamp heads and in the interim the flat flame burners may be used if necessary. Gas inspectors reported that after making tests with lamps equipped with governors he had ascertained that such lamps produced a higher candle power and that there was also a possibility of saving a little on gas.

## BUMPER SUGAR CROP

Hawaiian Sugar Islanders Will Have Another Big Yield.

C. Hedemann, of Honolulu, a well-known sugar man of the Hawaiian islands, is in the city today at the West hotel. Mr. Hedemann is making a business trip thru the northwest in the interests of his sugar and other interests in the islands and to become acquainted with the trade.

"The sugar crop of the islands will be the same as ever, a bumper," said Hedemann. He has records for sugar production, and will try to hold them till old Mauna Loa breaks loose again and buries the plantations. ## AGED WOMAN IN PITIABLE PLIGHT

### PENILESS AND FRIENDLESS, KNOWS NOT WHERE TO TURN.

Human Society Interests Itself in Sad Case of Mrs. Christine Swenson, Whose Money is Gone and Who Says She Has Been Deserted by Her Children.

Unable to speak English, without a cent of money, without friends or relatives and claiming to be deserted by her children, Mrs. Christine Swenson, 71 years old, finds herself in a pitiful plight. She has applied to the Humane society for assistance. Her present trouble is made doubly hard by the fact that six years ago she came to Minneapolis with \$6,000.

Up to last summer Mrs. Swenson lived with her daughter and son-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Walmer Lokander, and their children. In July the mother was sent up into the country to visit friends. She liked the place and stayed there until a short time ago, when, after she had failed to hear from her children in Minneapolis for some time, she came back to the city to find out what was the trouble.

She was told that her daughter, with her husband and children, had packed up their household goods and had moved to Stockholm, Sweden. They are said to have gone without leaving any word or any funds for the old woman, who was long enough in Sweden to find out that her children had not returned.

Since her return, Mrs. Swenson has lived with kind countrymen, who have been sorry for her. She has tried to do a little work to pay her board. Her age and infirmities, however, prevent her from doing hard work and her benefactors are unable to care for her with extra expenses of winter coming on.

For the past week the Humane society agents have been trying to find work or a home for her, and she herself has hobbled miles in search of honest work that she could do, but has met with most discouraging failure. She is breaking down in spirit as well as in strength, and has almost given up hope. She says that if she could get back to Sweden she could find friends and a home, but there seems to be no way to get her across the water.

## SEEKING FOR MOTIVE

Detectives Trying to Find Proof of Mrs. Brennan's Guilt.

Detectives Helin and Hanson, assigned to the Brennan murder case, are endeavoring to find a suitable motive for the deed. The motive so far advanced is that Mrs. Brennan killed her stepchildren for revenge on her husband for mistreating her. The officials have been unable to find out whether she ever threatened murder or not. It is known that she never liked the children, but her husband never thought that she would murder. The little woman has never shown a violent temper and her friends do not believe her capable of committing such a deed.

Both Mrs. Brennan and her wounded stepson Thomas are still at the hospital. Mrs. Brennan will be taken to the jail this week.

## BURGLARS' THIRD VISIT

Residence of Mrs. Martha R. Pattee Robbed of \$30 in Currency.

The residence of Mrs. Martha R. Pattee, 125 State street, was broken into Monday for the third time in a year. The burglars secured entrance during the absence of the occupants by opening the front door with a skeleton key, and during the short time they were inside ransacked the premises thoroughly, securing about \$30 in currency.
