## RAILROADS

### C. P. R. WOULD HOLD TRADE

IT ANNOUNCES SPECIAL ROUTES AND SHORTER TIME FOR ORIENTAL SHIPMENTS.

Toronto, Nov. 14.—The Canadian Pacific company announces it is about to improve its service across Canada and on the Atlantic and the Pacific, and that it will divert to the Canadian route the whole oriental mail and passenger business entering at Hongkong.

It is planned to reduce the time from Vancouver to Hongkong from twenty-one to sixteen days by increasing the speed of the steamers from twelve to seventeen knots. The time across the continent is to be reduced from six to four days.

The boats planned for the Atlantic service are expected to get mails and passengers across in from five to six days.

A large expenditure will be entailed and the Canadian Pacific is now asking the government for subsidies for its Atlantic boats.

The government may decide to ask again for tenders from the Allan line.

### CANADIAN EXCURSIONS

Northern Pacific, Great Northern and Soo Line Make Reduced Rates.

Traveling passenger agents report that the Canadian excursion rates will bring business on account of the general prosperity of the whole in their territories. The tickets will be on sale Dec. 4 and will be good for three months.

The Northern Pacific, Great Northern and the Soo line have put in a rate of \$40 for the round trip to all points in Ontario, Quebec, west of and including Montreal, excepting points west of Pembroke and north of Gravenhurst. The points east of Montreal in Quebec, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia the rate will be \$40 plus a proportionate reduction east of Montreal.

It has been agreed that fifteen days additional will be made on the return limit on the payment of \$5; thirty days on payment of \$10; forty-five days for \$15; sixty days for \$20; extension beyond sixty days will be granted on payment of \$5 additional for each fifteen days or part thereof.

### Great Western Earnings.

Gross earnings of the Great Western road for the first week in November show an increase of \$5,527.19 over those of the corresponding week in 1904. The receipts were \$164,704.05, making the total for the fiscal year to date \$3,152,582.11.

### Northern Securities Annual.

New York, Nov. 14.—The annual meeting of the stockholders of the Northern Securities company, organized to hold the securities of the Great Northern and Northern Pacific railroads, but prevented from doing so by a decision of the United States supreme court, was held in Hoboken, N. J., yesterday. James J. Hill, George J. Baker, George W. B. Felt and Nicholas Terhune were elected directors for three years. James N. Hill was also elected a director in place of Daniel S. Lamont, deceased.

### RAILROAD NOTES.

Stock rates from Memphis to Chicago are being considered at an adjourned meeting today in the office of General Freight Agent W. E. Finckley of the Great Western road at St. Paul. The state railroad commission is also conducting a hearing today which is expected to establish a uniform minimum of stock shipments by the carload on all roads.

The novel week and winter excursions inaugurated by the Great Western road are being discussed today at a meeting of the Western Passenger association. The innovation of creating a rate in the winter, which reports that the rates are being reviewed with favor.

### HERRING SEASON OPENS

Packing Companies at Bayfield Prepare for Increased Business.

BAYFIELD, WIS.—The herring season has about begun and the packing companies of this industry means to Bayfield. All four packing companies are prepared to do almost twice their usual business this year and it is safe to say, fully \$1,000 a day will be paid out in wages alone.

Hundreds of miles of nets will be logged into Lake Superior. These nets are sixty feet in length and when lowered, many are chained together and allowed to remain in the water about twenty-four hours. When raised, they are hauled with nets, a day or two, and are not an unusual catch, and as the fish average three to the pound, an estimate of the number of fish hauled may be made.

### MUST STAND TRIAL

Court Decides Demurrers in Goll Case at Milwaukee.

MILWAUKEE, WIS.—Judge Quarles in the United States district court has sustained the demurrer on only two counts against Henry G. Goll, former assistant cashier of the First National bank of this city. The other ten counts still stand. No notice of appeal was given and the case was set for the January term. The two counts which were quashed Goll with unlawfully and feloniously on the National City bank of New York for different sums in favor of Tracy & Co. of this city. It is charged that the drafts were issued with intent to defraud the First National bank and its officers. The two counts are substantially alike.

The steamer Appomattox, which ran aground on North Point eleven days ago, was abandoned today and is a total wreck. The cargo, valued at \$75,000, while her cargo of soft coal totals about \$10,000 more, besides the pumps and working apparatus.

### CASE GROWS IN MYSTERY

Authorities Find Clue and Become Suspicious in Kidnapping Investigation.

PRAIRIE DU CHIEN, WIS.—The Crawford authorities believe they know where to find August Hagen, the 21st who mysteriously disappeared from the R-C-C school house last Thursday. District Attorney W. R. Graves has given all his information to Charles Hagen, guardian of the girl, and the county attorney expects the girl to be found today. If located, she will be brought to this city.

Whether the girl really was kidnapped or was a party to some mysterious conspiracy was not communicated to the district attorney, who now convicts in the letters received by himself and the county judge were bona fide and that the girl is in hiding with a family in the kickapoo valley near Westport. The district attorney will be done by the county officials until the guardian has followed the instructions of the district attorney, and should their effort prove fruitless, the authorities admit they will be entirely at sea.

If it should prove to be true that the kidnapping was a sham no motive can be assigned to explain the girl's disappearance. The description of the man who abducted the young woman has been secured. Their coats were buttoned over their chains and their caps pulled down over their eyes.

### GLENCOE GOLDEN WEDDING

GLENCOE, MINN.—Mr. and Mrs. Bradbury Richardson of this village celebrated their golden wedding at Brighton, a little village at that time, about three miles east of Rochester, N. Y. They came to Glencoe in the fall of 1856 and have lived here ever since.

MADISON, WIS.—Regent Manus Swenson of the state university says that the charges against Dean Henry Knapp have been investigated and not sustained. Swenson states that the regents and Dean Henry Knapp found Knapp a very hard man to get along with, and his insubordination became so great that the regents decided to notify him that his services would no longer be required after the end of the year.
