

FARMS BURNED BY BIG PRAIRIE FIRE

BUILDINGS, CROPS AND LIVE STOCK DESTROYED BY FLAMES.

Reports from Devastated Districts Slowly Coming In to Aberdeen Show Heavy Losses—Three Sections of Townships Burned by Prairie Fire in Clay County, Minnesota.

ABERDEEN, S. D.—Details of losses by the prairie fires that swept over a large section of Brown county on Wednesday are slowly reaching Aberdeen.

Maynard, a farmer, lost \$1,000 in crops and livestock.

J. N. Graham, living nine miles north of Aberdeen, lost all of his personal property except his house and its contents.

Cornelius Kioch lost all his personal property, including grain, hay, livestock and buildings, except a team of horses which he had hitched up at the time the fire reached his farm.

Joseph Brandel lost all his personal property except fourteen head of cattle and eight steers. His barn and other farm buildings were destroyed.

Two schoolhouses were destroyed, the Chapman school, six miles from Aberdeen, and an abandoned schoolhouse near Frederick.

Big Fire in Clay County.

MOORHEAD, MINN.—Sections 1 and 12 in Moland township and 21 in Flowing, this county, were devastated by a prairie fire yesterday. A high wind prevailed and at least 1,000 tons of hay were destroyed. The village of Averill narrowly escaped being wrecked.

It is believed that workmen, while arranging their mowing meal, started the fire, the high wind fanning it to a blaze that soon got beyond their control.

Carrington Escapes Fire.

CARRINGTON, N. D.—This town was greatly wrought up yesterday when an alarm of fire. A large area of country north of town was on fire and was being fanned by a high wind. The department called for help and excellent service, finally succeeding in extinguishing the flames.

ESCAPE-JURY SERVICE

Pierre Residents Take Up Claims and List Is Exhausted.

PIERRE, S. D.—So many residents of this city have been ill since the North-Western extension work began that when the jury list was called in court yesterday the attorneys discovered that about one-fourth of those who had been drawn for jury duty put in pleas that they are residents of another county. As a result, it was necessary to issue a special venire to fill out the list.

The state auditor yesterday filed his report with governor Blood. The report will be ready for distribution at an early date and will for the first time contain an official report of the financial condition of the counties under the law of the last session. Such reports have been used in past years, but were supplied by county auditors at will, as a matter of courtesy to the state auditor.

The supreme court has granted an order to show cause in an application for writ of habeas corpus in the Hubbard murder case from Beadle county, and has set Nov. 29 as the date for argument on the application.

The state land department has sold to the Lawrence road an equity in a lot at Rapid City for part of way purposes. The property was a right of that turned over to the state W. W. Taylor.

The Western Boarding & Supply company of Chicago has secured the contract for boarding the men who will be working on the bridge and other work of the railway company this winter. He is sitting up a camp.

LARGE SCHOOL ATTENDANCE

HURON, S. D.—The enrollment at the city schools now exceeds 700, the largest in their history. The attendance at Huron college is also up to 100. The school board is pleased as farm work slackens the number of students who come to the city.

Corn gathering is the order in this section of the state. The crop is the largest and best ever grown in this locality and for several miles in the product of what is known as "corn-belt" and Illinois are astonished at the state's crop. There is a disposition on the part of farmers generally to feed cattle and hogs, rather than ship their surplus corn to eastern markets. There is a scarcity of help in gathering the good crop.

The Great Northern railway has made its first big haul between Huron and Rapid City and Minneapolis and St. Paul, by announcing that a sleeper will hereafter be run from Huron to the city, leaving here every evening at 7 o'clock and arriving in Minneapolis and St. Paul the following morning at 8 o'clock.

DEADWOOD WANTS FOUNDRY

Site and Bonus Will Be Offered Nebraska Concern.

DEADWOOD, S. D.—The business men of Deadwood are determined to secure the Nebraska foundry, which is about to be moved to some place in the hills. A site will be turned over free and some bonus money given, and it is believed that the best location either in Deadwood or between this place and Lead. It will employ 200 men and will cost \$100,000.

Rev. W. E. King, pastor of the First Baptist church in this city, has organized a club for the boys under the age of 15, which is intended to keep them from the streets. The Home-Home company recently gave the lumber in two old buildings to be used for putting up quarters for the club.

KNIGHTS AT SIOUX FALLS

Large Gathering Expected Sunday at Initiation Exercises.

SIOUX FALLS, S. D.—Preparations of an elaborate character are being made for a big meeting of Knights of Columbus to be held here next Sunday for the purpose of initiating a large class of new members.

The knights of Sioux City, Chamberlain, Huron, Yankton, Watertown, Mitchell and other cities will send delegations and the meeting will probably be the largest of the kind held here this year. One of the features will be an address by Right Rev. Thomas O'Gorman of this city, Catholic bishop of South Dakota. He is one of the leading orators of the northwest.

According to R. F. Pettigrew, former senator from South Dakota who has returned to his home in this city from a business trip to New York city, Hearst will win in his contest for mayor in that city. He is on terms of intimacy with Hearst and declares that Hearst, by a fair count, would have won the recent election.
