CRIME TO IGNORE PERIL IN WATER

DR. P. M. HALL URGES THAT CITY ANSWER MR. LOWRY.

Commissioner of Health Indicates Grave Danger in Putting Off Filtration and Pleads That Mr. Lowry Be Requested to Hold Open His Generous Offer of Site for Pure-Water Plant.


"It would be deplorable if the city could not take advantage of Thomas Lowry's offer to donate sixty acres adjoining the reservoir as a site for a filtration plant," said Dr. P. M. Hall, health commissioner, today.

"A board of experts, who have studied the local problem very thoroughly, has reported that the most feasible as well as the most economical method of securing a supply of pure water is to construct a sand filtration plant. The cost will be great, but not as great as in many other cities."

VETERAN LAWYER DEAD IN HIS BED

GEORGE R. ROBINSON PASSES AWAY AT ROBINSDALE HOME.

He Had Been in Continuous Practice in Minneapolis for Nearly Forty Years and Had Served as County Attorney—Death, Due to Heart Trouble, Not Unexpected.

George R. Robinson, the oldest practicing attorney in Minneapolis, was found dead in his bed this morning at his home, on a farm in Brookside town, about four miles north of Robbinsdale.

Mr. Robinson was a veteran of the civil war, serving as adjutant of the Thirty-eighth Iowa infantry. He was wounded before Vicksburg and discharged from the service as disabled.

Mr. Robinson returned from his work last evening in a weakened condition and went to bed early, telling his wife that he thought he would be all right in the morning. When Mrs. Robinson went to his room to call him in the usual time this morning she received no response and, walking over to the bed, found that he had died in the night and that his body was cold.

Mr. Robinson's first wife died several years ago, and his daughter Mary, who discouraged and despondent at his death, left alone to look care of the household until about two years ago, when she took her own life in a cornfield near the house.

GOVERNOR WRITES ON BUTCHERY OF JEWS

J. P. Solomon, editor of the Jewish Standard of New York, has asked Governor Johnson for an expression on the Jewish atrocities in Russia, as part of a symposium on the subject.

"It is superfluous for me to say that I, in common with all the people of Minnesota, have been inexpressibly shocked at reports of the butchery of Jews in Russia. It is a crime against humanity, but an affront to a God of mercy that the Russian people must pay dearly for. That thousands of helpless Jews have been ruthlessly killed, that their families have been scattered to the seven winds, I do not take to be a reflection on this people as a law-abiding race.
